Strange But True

Indians and Eskimos are so unlike in many ways that it's very doubtful whether they sprang from the same family tree.

The Eskimo is not dark-skinned nor yet red-skinned, although many people think so. Lack of soap and water plus the constant exposure to Arctic cold and winds, as well as his practice of anointing himself with sea oil makes him look much darker than he actually is.

Again, Eskimos are short, squat people with oily black hair and broad faces. The Indian as you know, is tall, lean and featured more like the white man, excepting for the high cheek bones.

Their mode of living, too, always differed from that of the Indians and the two factions or groups waged a never-ending war with each other.

In every Eskimo family the father and boys are served first, and according to an ancient custom they get the choicest pieces of meat.

Before becoming our 10th Province, the government of Newfoundland placed the dog called for that country on its postage stamps. No other country had honored a dog in this way before.

Life is present everywhere throughout the mass of ocean waters, from the equator to the poles and from the surface down to the bottom at a depth of six miles. In depths of 1200 feet the fish are mostly laterally compressed and grey in color with blue-black or brown on the back.
