

Peace Is Seen Threatened By Foreign Aid Reduction

WASHINGTON (CP) — World peace is threatened by a reduction in foreign aid, three financial leaders told the annual meeting of the World Bank and International Monetary Fund here.

"If the momentum of economic growth in Africa, Asia and Latin America is allowed to slow, if nations in those regions lose heart, then the prospect is for deterioration in world affairs that in the end will inevitably become of the highest concern in the industrial nations themselves," said George Woods, World Bank president.

U.S. President Will Attend 7-Country Philippines Talk

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson will fly to the Philippines in about three weeks for a seven-country summit conference of the Vietnam war. A major aim will be to press for a peace offensive. Announcement of the 10,000-mile trip immediately stirred speculation as to whether Johnson might visit South Viet Nam itself as well as other Far Eastern countries. His arrival in the Philippines on or about Oct. 18 will put him within 1,000 miles of Saigon.

The conference was publicly called Monday night by President Ferdinand E. Marcos of the Philippines to include all countries with military forces engaged on the anti-Communist side in the Viet Nam conflict. The matter had been discussed by Johnson and Marcos when the Philippines leader visited Washington from Sept. 14 to 16.

The other participating countries are the Philippines, with 200 troops in South Viet Nam and 2,000 going there; South Korea, with 39,000 troops; Thailand, 4,500; New Zealand, 200; and South Viet Nam itself, with 797,000, including 320,000 regular forces.

Chairman J. W. Fulbright (Dem. Ark.) of the U.S. Senate foreign relations committee, a critic of U.S. policy in Viet Nam, said the Manila meeting would be more useful if such countries as Japan, India and Pakistan participated.

SOME FEEL CHILL

Pierre Paul Schweitzer, IMF managing director, said the leading industrial nations are ignoring a situation of the gravest concern if they fail to expand foreign assistance because of preoccupation with their own inflationary trends, pursuit of economic growth and measures to reduce their balance-of-payments deficits.

Conference chairman Jamshid Amouzegar of Iran, welcoming the 105 countries from the non-Communist world, said it is unrealistic to think a situation can persist in which the industrial nations of North America, Europe and the western Pacific, with less than one-fifth of the global population, "produce and enjoy more than half the world's wealth."

Delegate To South Viet Nam Personal Friend Of Pope's

VATICAN CITY (Reuters)—Archbishop Sergio Pignedoli, the Roman Catholic apostolic delegate to Canada who will head a special Vatican City mission to South Viet Nam, has been a personal friend of Pope Paul for 20 years and is closely acquainted with his thinking.

He then was named an archbishop and given his first diplomatic assignment as apostolic nuncio in Bolivia. From there he was transferred as apostolic nuncio to Venezuela.

Under Pope John, he was posted to Lagos Nigeria as Apostolic delegate for west-central Africa where he remained until his transfer in June, 1964, as apostolic delegate in Ottawa.

40 Whites Attend N.Y. Negro School

NEW YORK (AP) — Every week day, 40 Brooklyn white children leave their middle-class homes for an hour's bus ride to a poor, predominantly Negro and Puerto Rican area. There, they go to school.

It is called "reverse open enrollment"—while children being bused to a Negro and Puerto Rican school—and the white parents are thrilled to see their children go.

In fact, it was their idea.

The experiment began at the peak of the furor, in the United States over proposal to bus Negro pupils to white schools.

It was predicted then that reverse open enrollment wouldn't last three weeks, and those involved count it a smashing success.

"These" white parents have very strong convictions about integration," said Carl V. Warren, principal at Public School 20 where the program is in effect.

This year, there are 40 children in the program. The first year there were 32 and last year 43.

CONTRACT BRIDGE

BIDDING QUIZ
You are South, neither side vulnerable. The bidding has been:

West North East South
1 ♠ 1 ♠ Pass ♠

What would you bid now with each of the following five hands?

- ♠ Q763 ♥ AK982 ♦ 95 ♣ 73
- ♠ AK74 ♥ QJ83 ♦ Q943 ♣ 45
- ♠ 88 ♥ K974 ♦ AJ53 ♣ Q762
- ♠ K92 ♥ 4 ♦ AK762 ♣ 7543
- ♠ A9853 ♥ AK7542 ♦ 6 ♣ 49

1. Two spades. The trap to avoid is a bid of two hearts at this point. A two-heart bid would not indicate spade support; on the contrary, it would tend strongly to deny adequate spade support. Furthermore, a response of two hearts would not be forcing and might result in the wrong part-score contract if North's hand were such that he had to pass.

2. Four spades. The way to show support for spades is by raising spades; it is not necessary to particularize the nature of the spade raise at this point. It is also important to remember that North did not open the bidding but merely competed against an opening bid. Presumably his overall was directed more towards competing for a part score than a game.

3. Four spades. It would be overly pessimistic to expect partner to lose four tricks opposite this fine hand. The only alternative bid, three spades, would not be forcing and North might take it into his head to pass, holding minimum values for an overall. The singleton club, which North could hardly visualize if you jumped to only three spades, is the decisive feature.

3. Pass. This not a pleasant decision to make, holding a singleton spade, but it is the safest thing to do. The only other possible bid, one notrump, is fraught with danger. The point is that game is unlikely on the evidence at hand, and trying to improve your position by bidding one notrump may make matters only worse—for example, if partner now bids two spades.

4. Three spades. It's hard to gauge the game prospects all by yourself—and you therefore solicit partner's opinion in the matter by inviting him to go on to four spades. The double-raise is unusual with only three trumps, but there are compensating features. If you had a fourth trump, in place of a diamond, or a club, you would bid four by yourself.

5. Four notrump. It is reasonable to assume that you can make a slam if partner has an ace—therefore, use Blackwood. The intention is to quit at five spades if North responds five clubs, showing no aces, and bid six spades if North responds five diamonds, showing one ace.
