Potato Marketing Top Question At Meeting

A discussion on the potato marketing question, and the agricultural products co-operative marketing act highlighted the semi-annual meeting of the P. E. I. Farmers Federation held at Bridgetown last night. Mr. D. A. MacDonald, chairman of the Potato Marketing Board, presented a concise and enlightening picture of the potato marketing and price trend during the past three years. Last fall, in view of conditions, he stated, his board had moved to establish a minimum price on seed, but was finally forced to give way in March owing to pressure from other competitive supply sources, primarily Maine, which could send potatoes into Canada without restrictive duties. He forecast greater potato acreage for this year, and possibly a greater yield, which would leave the marketing and price in a fluid state, the trend of which would be difficult to determine at this time. He went on to discuss the wheat pool system in use in the western provinces, and advocated a similar system for potato growers in this province. Mr. Lincoln Dewar, provincial secretary, further explained this.

by saying that the marketing of P. E. I. potatoes would be subject to some qualified agency. A guaranteed initial payment would be made to growers after delivery, with a final payment to be made after disposal of the product. This was designed to promote stability of returns to the grower, rather than have the extreme fluctuations which prevailed from last fall to this spring, and the consequent loss to growers who tried to market their product at this time. Resolution Passed Mr. MacDonald stated that an application had been made to the Government to come under this plan next year, provided that it met with the approval of the growers of the province. A resolution empowering the board to negotiate such an agreement with the government was passed at the meeting. Other items on the agenda included a report on accident insurance by J. L. 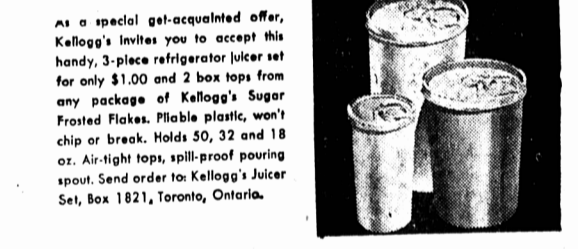
