**Pennsylvania Plans For Collapsible Dam**

SUNBURY, Pa. (AP) — Pennsylvania is just steps away from starting construction on one of the new wonders of the push-button age — a collapsible dam that can be inflated or deflated with the flick of a switch. The \$900,000 dam will be built on the Susquehanna River near Sunbury. It will create one of the finest water-based recreation spots in Pennsylvania.

Plans call for a multi-section rubberized dam 7½ feet high and 1,975 feet long, located three miles below the confluence of the north and west branches of the Susquehanna.

The Susquehanna rises in upper New York state and flows into the Chesapeake Bay. Among river systems east of the Mississippi, it is ranked third by hydrologists, behind the St. Lawrence and Tennessee.

Once completed, the dam is expected to resemble seven giant "tear-drops" or "sausages" strung together across the river. Inflated with water on the bottom and air on the top, the dam will form a 3,000-acre pool of water surface for boating, fishing and, eventually swimming. In times of flood warning, it can be deflated within minutes to let high water pass downstream. Operation of the dam will be

controlled by a pumphouse on the east bank of the river where water and air can be pumped into and taken out of the fabric "bags" with the press of a button to keep the river at predetermined elevations throughout the year.

"The dam will be made of a tough laminated material, combining rubber and nylon," he said. "One inch of this material can support 3,200 pounds of pressure."






So strong and durable is the material, dam designers feel it can withstand heavy ice jams floating trees or houses, and even a hunter who might accidentally shoot a hole into it.

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**Development Planned For Signal Hill**

OTTAWA (CP) — A two-year \$300,000 development program for the Signal Hill national historic park in Newfoundland has been announced by the federal resources department.

The program, to get under way this year, calls for construction of a \$175,000 visitors' centre and water and sewage facilities costing \$125,000. The centre will include an exhibit area, the superintendent's office and a museum workshop.

The St. John's architectural firm of Horwood and Guhan will be consultants for the work. Signal Hill, for many years a fortified strong point protecting St. John's harbor, was the spot where Marconi received the first Trans-Atlantic radio signal.

**Pugwash Talks Are Concluded**

VENICE, Italy (Reuters) — The 14th Pugwash conference on science and world affairs has ended a six-day meeting here in agreement that the United Nations should do "everything possible" to bring about peace in Viet Nam.

But those attending were in disagreement on the methods that should be employed.

Scientists from East and West attended the closed-door, unofficial conference, which started Sunday and takes its name from the Nova Scotia town of Pugwash where the first such meeting was held in 1957.

**FLIES PACIFIC SOLO**

SYDNEY, Australia (Reuters) — The first Australian woman to fly solo across the Pacific ocean landed at Kingsford airport here Saturday. Rosalind Merrifield, 27, flew a Piper Aztec plane from San Francisco to Sydney via Honolulu, Canton Island and Fiji in 50 hours flying time spread over seven days. She was accompanied in a second small plane by the chief pilot of an Australian rent-a-plane firm for which the planes were brought here.

**PROVINCE OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND NOTICE TO POTATO PRODUCERS**

WITH RESPECT TO VOTER QUALIFICATIONS FOR POTATO MARKETING PLEBISCITE APRIL 21, 1965.

In order that misunderstanding and confusion be kept to a minimum on voting day, the following information is released for the assistance of Deputy Returning Officers and Agents and for the information of voters:

- (1) Voters must be Canadian citizens.
- (2) Voters must have attained their 18th birthday on or before April 21, 1965.
- (3) Voters must be Registered Producers with the Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board.
- (4) The growing of one acre of potatoes in 1964 on land either owned or rented or placed at the disposal of a voter by a parent for the growing of potatoes is a necessary qualification.
- (5) Women who are growers in their own right and meet other qualifications are eligible.
- (6) A wife is not eligible to vote on her husband's qualifications.
- (7) A voter may vote in only one poll which must be the poll in which he or she resides.
- (8) In no case may two persons vote on one acre of potatoes nor three persons vote on two acres and so on.
- (9) Before receiving a ballot, all voters will be required to sign a declaration which will have the same force and effect as if made under oath.
- (10) Penalties are provided for the signing of a false declaration.
- (11) Polls will remain open from 1:00 p.m. Wednesday, April 21 until 9:00 p.m. the same day.

**GREETING: A PROCLAMATION**

WHEREAS the importance of early and sustained education of individuals as to what alcohol and other narcotics really are and what they do, has gained recognition increasingly and progressively of late years particularly because of its potential worth in preventing lawlessness involving young people.

AND WHEREAS Citizens of Prince Edward Island who realize the present day need for giving our young people the benefit of all possible wholesome aid and guidance are sincerely interested in such education:

AND WHEREAS we note with concern that the problem of alcoholism and the matter of beverage alcohol and other narcotics merit the utmost serious attention and study by parents, teachers and all others whose activities, either natural or professional, bring them into contact with youth;

AND WHEREAS it has never been more important in the history of our nation and Province than now to bring to our youth the truth about temperance;

NOW THEREFORE We, with the advice and consent of Our Executive Council for Prince Edward Island, do by this Our Proclamation order and declare that the period from the nineteenth to the Twenty-fifth Days of April in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and sixty-five be set aside as

and urge that all citizens of Prince Edward Island consider the matter of Youth Alcohol Education as a year-round project.
