

# Firm Donates \$800 To Fund For Hospitals

The firm of Carvell Brothers, Charlottetown, has contributed \$800 to the joint hospital campaign launched several months ago by the Charlottetown and Prince Edward Island hospitals. It was announced last evening by Jack Johnston, campaign chairman.

The amount brought the total subscribed to date to \$74,119.56. The objective of the joint campaign was \$200,000.

# Commission To Study Building Tax

Housing Commission chairman Reid Sangster announced yesterday that the commission is holding a special week to hold discussions to determine the probable effect the 11 per cent federal tax on building materials will have on the co-operative housing program.

It is noted that there is already a five per cent provincial sales tax on such materials, he said.

Additional tax costs would result in serious hardship to those in low-cost housing who have only limited incomes.

He estimated that on a \$6,500 building loan from the commission the total tax now could amount to \$1,040.

At present there are two co-operative housing projects in operation, one in Kings County and another in Prince, with plans to start others. In addition a number of other groups are in the formation stage.

# Atlantic Development Board's Aim Outlined

Introduced by chairman Randolph Manning, the speaker outlined the objectives of the organization which he said was for the present inactive, having had only one meeting thus far in Ottawa and one in Moncton. Meetings will shortly be held at key places in the Atlantic Provinces to probe the possibilities for expansion of business through trade board and other service association suggestions.

"The organization has been designed to protect the economy of the Atlantic Provinces in the wake of the rest of Canada. We are far behind with a one-third lower income rating than all the rest of Canada," Mr. McQuaid said.

The speaker referred to the high percentage of unemployment and stated that the only way to bring the provinces in line would be to supply permanent jobs.

Mr. McQuaid commended APFC for its research and said that 150,000 permanent jobs and an investment of \$4,000,000,000 by 1980 would be necessary to bring the Atlantic Provinces economy and standard of living up to a reasonable expectation.

The representations made by local organizations to provide ways and means to improve the economy and to be scrutinized by the development board, as in the other provinces involved and presented to the Government of Canada. There will be practically no outright grants.

Other problems to be dealt with are the coal mines in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick and the development of tidal power.

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# American Navy Destroyers Paying Two-Day Visit To Port

Two United States Navy destroyers, whose homebase is Providence, R.I., arrived in Charlottetown for a two-day visit to the city yesterday shortly before 5 p.m.

The two ships, the USS Tills and USS Parle are tied up at the Railway Wharf, and from here they will head Wednesday for Quebec City before returning to their U.S. base.

Both ships have a complement of 220 officers and men. The Tills is commanded by Cmdr. W. A. Rios and the Parle by Lt. Cmdr. C. W. Jones. On hand at the wharf to greet the ships was Lieut. Eldon Darrach, staff officer, HMCS Queen Charlotte.

Last night the ships' officers were the guests of Capt. L. Prowse and the officers of Queen Charlotte at a reception in the wardroom of the local naval establishment.
