## Nine-Year Old Boy Killed At Mayfield

Barry Gallant, nine-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. George Gallant, Mayfield, died in the Charlottetown Hospital yesterday following an accident which occurred on the Mayfield Road at noon. A nearby neighbor said last night that the young lad was in collision with an automobile while crossing the highway immediately in front of his home. He had been visiting with an aunt, Mrs. Aubin Gauhier, whose home is located immediately opposite the Gallant residence. The car was proceeding south at the time.

The young accident victim is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. George Gallant, one sister, Aileen, 20, and two brothers, Ronald, 15, and Brian, 4.

Mr. Gallant is employed with the national parks service. The Mayfield Road runs from the park to Charlottetown.

An inquest will be held this morning at the Charlottetown Funeral Home commencing at 9:36. Coroner Dr. H.P. Stewart will preside.

## Inquest Will Be Held Into American's Death

Coroner Dr. Charles Dewar O'Leary, said yesterday that no date had as yet been set for the inquest which will be held in connection with the death of a man, believed to be an American, whose body was discovered early yesterday at Hebron Sands near West Point.

The remains were viewed this morning by a coroner's jury made up as follows: John Edward Bulger, Glenwood, foreman; Basil Fred Millman; Coleman; Charles Bruce Dumville, West Cape; Willard Foster Hurlbly; Hebron; John Wilbur MacKenzie; Hobron; John Angus MacKenzie, Bree; and Cowan Rankin Wallace, O'Leary.

The remains were forwarded to Charlottetown via the Jolley Funeral Home ambulance for identity examination and possible autopsy.

The body was clothed in light green shirt, work trousers and thick-soled sport shoes were on the feet.

## ADDITIONAL TEACHERS TO BE HIRED

Summerside School board to accept eligible students from St. Mary's Academy operated by St. Paul's Roman Catholic parish in Summerside has resulted in the preparation of additional classroom facilities on which work is now underway.

Arrangements are also being completed for the hiring of additional teachers to provide instruction for the approximately 700 additional children from St. Mary's Academy that will be added to the anticipated enrollment at the Summerside public elementary and high schools.

It is reported that the legal action taken by the school commission of St. Paul's Parish requesting the supreme Court to accept the children normally attending St. Mary's Academy has been dropped, because the school board had agreed to accept these students at the beginning of the new school term.

A further anticipated increase in the enrollment resulting from the occupation of the Hillcrest housing development by incoming RCAF families is also a factor which requires the consideration of the school board.

With the increased numbers of students that seems likely to be presented for enrollment at the beginning of the new school term, the town council and the Summerside school board are faced with the problem of providing sufficient teachers and accommodations for the students.

At the present time additional school construction seems likely, and the increased educational costs for more teachers and accommodation appears almost certain to result in an upward hike on last year's tax rate of \$2.00 per \$1,000 property assessment.

## Summerside To Enlarge School Room Facilities

Seven asphalt plants are going at full capacity to produce pavement for the highways of Prince Edward Island in one of the biggest programs of hard surfacing in the history of the province.

To date the Hayes plant working in the Alberton district has completed a stretch of road between Alberton and Tignish as well as streets within the towns and villages. This plant will move shortly to O'Leary and will start paving toward West Cape.

Curran and Briggs Summerside plant has already completed a portion of the Linkletter Road and is making preparations to move to the Blue Shank Road.

Warren Maritimes Limited is moving its plant to Borden and will complete contracts at Augustine Cove and at Chelton. Curran and Briggs, Milton plant has been supplying asphalt for paving in the Brackley Point area and at Mayfield and is preparing to shift operations to the Rocky Point district.

Warren's Charlottetown plant will shortly start work in the Bunsbury and Johnstone's River section. The Island Construction Co. is paving between Murray River and Murray Harbour and will shift work shortly to the Commercial Road and the Wood Islands shore road.



## Interest Rate Hiked Again

OTTAWA (CP)—The Bank of Canada interest rate increased this week to 5.31 per cent from 5.26 last week, the central bank reported Thursday.

The rise wiped out half of the decline of .10 per cent that occurred last week when the rate dropped from 5.36 per cent. The present rate, which is charged on any chartered bank borrowing from the central bank, compares with the peak 5.47 per cent on June 18 and the record low of 1.12 per cent last Aug. 2.

SUMMERSIDE—The "culminating point of a year's planning has almost been reached with the four day Summerside Lobster Carnival ready to open with a resounding bang next Wednesday afternoon. The final pieces were put in place at last night's meeting of the central committee held at Civic Stadium. Chairman Roy Johnston presided with all committee members represented.

Of course there are still several last minute items which cannot be arranged until that time but generally, everything appears to be in readiness for a tremendous show.

One change revealed at last night's meeting was that harness racing will be held on Thursday evening instead of Wednesday as originally planned due to "the Monctonian" being held Wednesday in Moncton which draws many of the top horses and jockeys. Racing is also scheduled for Saturday evening.

Roy Bates reporting for the Y's Men stated a float to carry the Sea Queen contestants in Thursday's parade has been arranged with the cooperation of Morrison and MacRae Ltd.

Also planned, he said, is a coronation parade on the night of Friday, July 17th which will include the Sea Queen and her princesses and other floats and formations.

Carnival director Charles Hogan stated that several persons

from various parts of the province will be at the Stadium displaying and making their various handicrafts.

Dave Carnegie, parade commander stated he expects 40 floats will take part in the parade, and there will definitely be six bands and six marching units in the mile and a half long parade. On Mr. Carnegie's suggestion it was decided to get Lowell Hancock to film the parade with his moving picture equipment after Mr. Hancock volunteered to do the job free of charge, other than the cost of film. Up to 50 dollars was voted for film.

It was decided that the price of the lobster supper will remain the same as last year.

The decision to dispense with earlier plans to charge for parking cars was agreed on resulting in new plans to have free, supervised parking.

But Premier Duplessis and his government are pressing the federal government for a larger slice of the national tax dollar. Mr. Duplessis would like to see the federal government move farther out of the direct taxation fields so that his government could absorb a larger share of revenue collected by Ottawa in this province.

Mr. Duplessis did not elaborate on what he means by a commonsense basis but it is well known that since 1948 he has consistently asked for a clear definition of the respective tax fields of the federal and provincial governments and simplification in tax collecting methods.

Mr. Duplessis said he would probably consent to minor amendments to the Canadian constitution but he would always oppose any proposals to change the basis of the pact of confederation.

The Quebec premier said he had Prime Minister Diefenbaker Wednesday to reiterate Quebec's "firm, clear and precise views" on constitutional and taxation issues.

"I met Mr. Diefenbaker to outline the desires and wishes of the province of Quebec. The federal government has changed hands, as I have said before, but Quebec's attitude on federal-provincial issues is unchanged."

A reporter asked Mr. Duplessis if he felt the federal government's attitude had changed.

"I hope so," he said.

Another asked if the question of federal grants-in-aid to Quebec universities had been discussed. Quebec universities do not accept federal aid because the government describes the grants as an encroachment on the province's exclusive rights in matters of education.

"We talked about the claims of the province of Quebec in all fields," said Mr. Duplessis.

"Moreover, our attitude on all these matters has always been ratified by the people of Quebec and I hope it will be ratified again in the future."

The premier said party politics play no part in federal-provincial talks. The discussions deal strictly with constitutional and taxation issues.

death March 17 of the former minister, Sidney Smith, and Mr. Green's appointment early last month.

### CANADA LOST CONTACT

He said the lapse in appointing an external affairs minister caused some loss of contact between Canada and the United Nations and other international bodies.

Canada must have an independent, co-operative and constructive foreign policy of its own, the CCF spokesman said. Too often in the past Canada had simply reflected the views of the United States.

Mr. Green said he intends to lead the Canadian delegation at the September session of the General Assembly and spend as much time there as possible. But he expected it would be impossible to be there for the whole session.

In his main policy statement, Mr. Green said the Canadian government has consistently supported proposals for negotiations with the Soviet Union on the Berlin and other issues.

"Since in this thermonuclear age war is unthinkable, there is no alternative to negotiation for the solution of these problems."

### RUSKIN LISTENS IN

Listening intently from the common's gallery throughout the debate was Russian Ambassador Amassap Aroutunian.

"At another point," Mr. Green said: "Unfortunately, circumstances do not seem propitious for great or sudden progress on the basic problem of (German) reunification."

"This should not, however, preclude us from attempting to create an atmosphere in which reunification can more easily be brought about."

Where the resumed Geneva foreign ministers conference would lead "cannot now be predicted."

### CANADA STILL HOPES

But the Canadian government still hopes a summit meeting can be arranged, he said.

Perhaps subjects such as nuclear weapons tests and peaceful uses of atomic energy might be discussed in addition to the Berlin problem.

"At this stage I think as few preconditions and prior stipulations as possible should be placed in the way of a summit meeting."
