

New Quebec Cabinet Takes Office Today

QUEBEC (CP)—A new provincial cabinet will be sworn in today amid expectations that two or three new faces will be added to the present 17 members.

There is widespread belief that the Quebec cabinet will get a woman member for the first time.

Three departments—finance, industry and commerce and municipal affairs—figure prominently in conjecture surrounding potential changes to follow the Liberal party's election victory last month.

Although most observers feel there will be few changes, one source indicated some present cabinet ministers would change jobs.

FEW HINTS

Premier Jean Lesage, a firm believer in the prerogative of a government leader to keep his own counsel, hasn't given a hint

of what changes will be made. And few have been forthcoming from his aides. Nevertheless, it is considered likely that Mr. Lesage will give up his finance portfolio to devote more time to his other duties, which will increase as the government embarks on long-term economic planning. The first steps in economic planning were announced during the campaign with publication of a report by the government's economic advisory council.

Mr. Lesage, who returned Monday from a 10-day post-election vacation, has to find someone to replace Andre Rousseau, personally defeated in L'Islet riding, to take over the trade and commerce department. Mr. Rousseau was the only minister to lose his seat in the election.

A-G DOUBTFUL

A question mark hangs over the portfolio of attorney-general. The present holder, Georges Laplante, often has indicated he would like to drop the job to concentrate on his other portfolio, cultural affairs.

NEW NAME FOR CLAY

An informed source said Mr. Laplante had been asked by the premier to stay on as attorney-general.

Mentioned as possible cabinet material are Mrs. Clair Kirk-

land-Castrain, Mr. first and one woman member of the legislature who sits for Jacques-Carter riding; Pierre Laporte, 40, member for Chambly; Clément Fortin, 47, member for Sherbrooke; Richard Heide, 34, member for Westmount; George and Speaker in the last assembly, and Guy Leclercq, 46, member for Vercheres.

House Briefs

OTTAWA (CP)—The CNR's share of the construction cost of the second trans-Canada microwave system is \$19,000,000. Transport Minister Balcer informed John R. Matheson (L—Leeds) in the Commons.

The CNR ferry William Carson has been unable to dock at North Sydney, N.S., on 82 occasions in the last five years because of ice in and near the harbor. Transport Minister Balcer told John B. Stewart (L—Antigonish—Guysborough). There were 28 such occasions this year, 28 in 1961. Estimated total damage to cargo and ship fixtures was \$70,000.

The agricultural stabilization board drops its selling price by four cents a pound on exports of Canada first grade cheddar cheese to the United Kingdom. Agriculture Minister Hamilton told Viateur Ethier (L—Glenagarry—Prescott).
