How to Visit Washington

OTTAWA, (CP) — Production Minister Howe will fly to Washington next week for new industrial mobilization talks with the United States government. The talks likely will centre on ways and means of maintaining and increasing the flow of arms across the United States-Canadian border. Scheduled to take place Oct. 8, the meeting also will likely see the two countries taking steps to reaffirm the principles for pooling the resources of the two countries for joint defence. The meeting will mark the revival of the Canada-U.S. joint industrial mobilization committee which has been relatively dormant for more than a year.
