POTATO BULLETIN

Surveys conducted for several years have shown that the cull or dump pile is the principal source of field infection with potato late blight disease states Bulletin No. 30. Late blight can develop on sprouts of diseased tubers in these piles of discarded potatoes and spread from there to nearby fields.

Many discarded tubers will be infected with virus diseases such as mosaic, leaf roll, and spindle tuber and, because cull piles are ideal breeding places for potato insects, they are serious threats to the health of commercial plantings. Cull piles, wherever found, should be burned or sprayed with a potato top killer.

A new insect on potatoes and other crops has appeared during the past week. This is a webworm which rolls the leaves and causes them to wilt. All potato fields should be checked immediately and if this insect is present spray or dust with DDT.

Historical Foundation For Senate in Canada

OTTAWA, (Special)—In a resumed debate on Senate reform last Thursday evening, J. Angus MacLean, Conservative, M.P. for Queens told the Commons that Ross Thatcher, Independent M.P. for Moose Jaw-Lake Centre had clearly not realized the historical foundation on which the Senate of Canada is based. Mr. Thatcher had complained that while New Brunswick had 10 members in the Senate, Saskatchewan which has a larger population, had only six.

Reason why a fixed number of senators was assigned the Maritime Provinces at Confederation, Mr. MacLean said, was so their voices would not be submerged to the point where their weight would be almost negligible. Senate representation is not nor was ever intended to be based on population, the Queens member said. He drew a parallel with the United States Senate which has two senators from each state, regardless of population. Hence Nevada with a population of 160,000 has the same number of senators as New York which has a population of 15 million.

Mr. MacLean strongly favored retention of the Senate as a chamber to review and if need be amend the legislation passed by the Commons. He argued that

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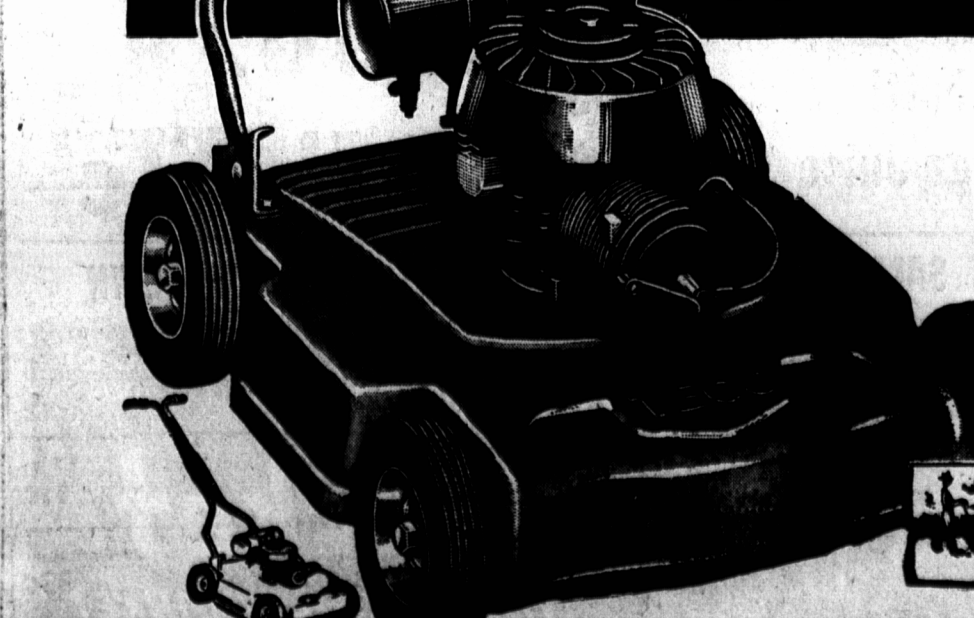
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
