Frost Blasts CBC Coverage

TORONTO (CP) — Premier Frost on the weekend delivered the second of two blows at the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation.

Dissatisfied with broadcast coverage of Thursday's Ontario election, in which his administration was returned, the premier expanded his criticism and declared: "The government's part in TV and broadcasting ought to be regulated. It should not be in the business. Far better results would be obtained by private stations . . ."

In a statement handed to the CBC, he said:

"In my judgment the whole principle of the CBC is wrong. The government has no right to be in the business of disseminating stanted news, or any other news. The first hour of the election broadcast was biased, slanted and prejudiced. The fact that little or no coverage was given to the government side on election night was only incidental. There is only one cure for this situation and that is to bring in good private radio and TV stations . . ."

NEWSPAPER INTERVIEW

The statement followed by a day an interview with the Toronto Globe and Mail in which the premier said it was "the height of insolence" for the CBC to suggest that he come from his home in Lindsay to appear on television election night.

The CBC replied Saturday that the invitation was made because technical difficulties made it impractical to set up equipment for a live telecast from Lindsay.

In the interview Mr. Frost said the CBC had done an excellent job arranging live telecasts from homes of his opponents.

Laurence Duffy, manager of CBC Television News, said every effort was made to originate a live broadcast from Lindsay but "it was unfeasible to do so, very much to the CBC's regret."

He added: "Mr. Frost's charge that our broadcast was a biased and distorted picture of the election surprised us since we felt certain we had given a fair-minded report, not only of the government's return to power but also of the gains that were made by the opposition parties . . ."

"From the start, CBC reported a Progressive Conservative trend and at no time did they indicate that the over-all result was in any doubt . . ."

Queen Inspects 1700 Guardmen

LONDON (Reuters) — The Queen, clad in a scarlet military uniform and black tricorn hat, rode side-saddle on a chestnut police horse to inspect 1,700 guardsmen in the annual trooping of the color Saturday.

Huge crowds stood in brilliant sunshine to watch the spectacle held in honor of the sovereign's official birthday. Her real birthday is April 21 but the official celebration is in June because the weather is normally more suitable for the military pageantry of trooping the color.

Saturday's ceremony honored the 3rd Battalion of the Coldstream Guards Regiment — the last time the battalion's colors will be "trooped." In September, the battalion will be suspended as part of the program for reducing Britain's armed forces.

PALL MALL CROWDED
The Queen rose in procession from Buckingham Palace down crowded, mile-long Pall Mall to the Horse Guards parade grounds. Behind her rode the Duke of Gloucester, colonel of the Scots Guards.

For 45 minutes, the Queen inspected the guardsmen while a burning sun glistened on burnished breastplates and bayonets. The Guards then marched past. Shortly after the Queen had ridden back to the palace, she appeared with her husband on the balcony to watch an air salute by 16 jet fighter planes.

The trooping the color passed off without a hitch but just before the planes flew over Buckingham Palace, one guardsman succumbed to the bugaboo feared annually by all the troops.

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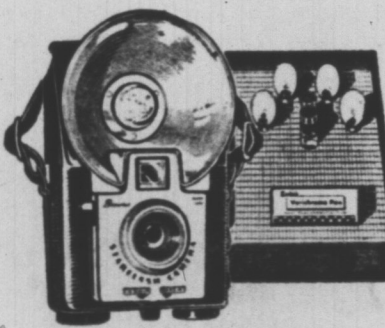
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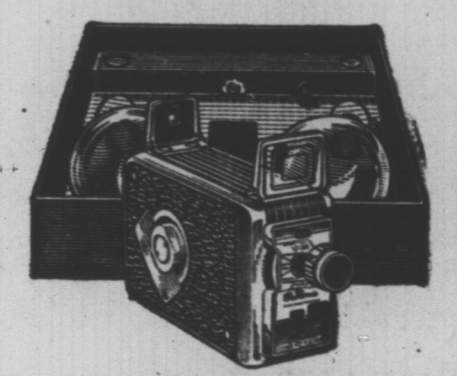


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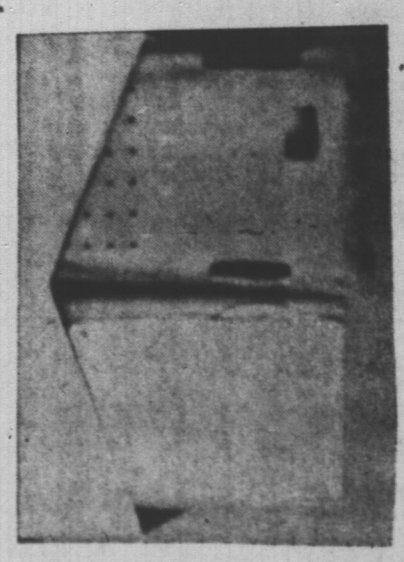
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
