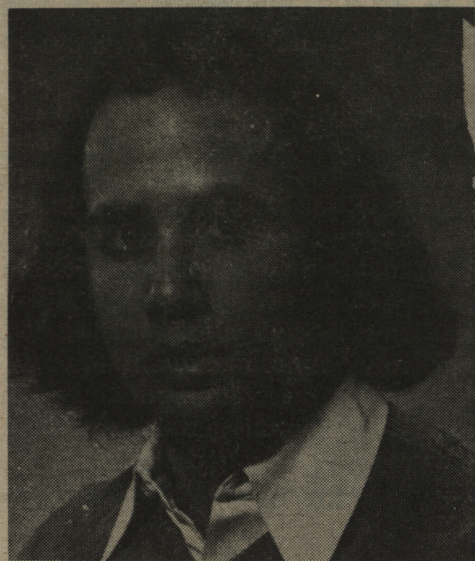


TREASURER



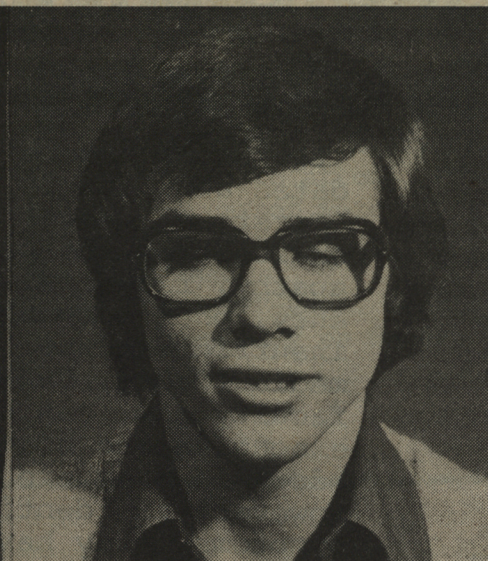
Raymond H. Shalala

In an interview with radio CIMN all three agreed that the Cafeteria in the Barn should at least be breaking even and if possible show a profit.

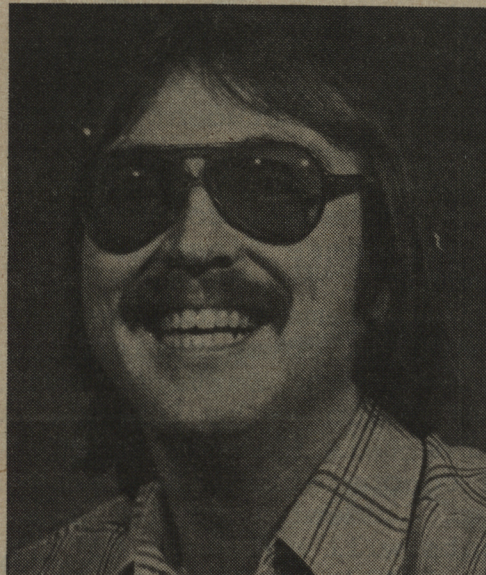
As the Treasurer will be in constant contact with the Business Manager, Candidates were asked how they felt this position should operate.

Carol MacDonald wanted a full-time Business and Alan Long thought that a part-time Business Manager was better than not having any.

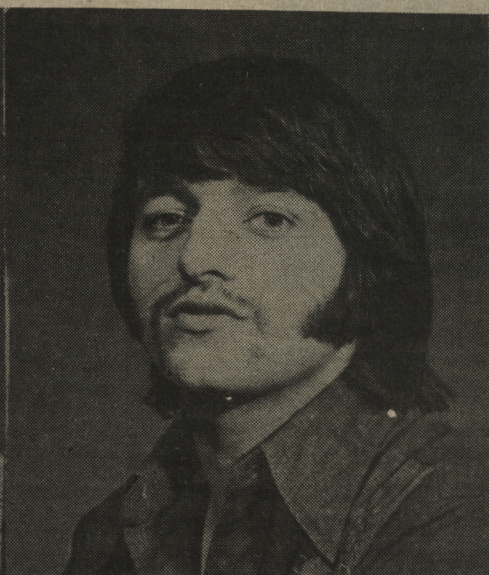
