Pointers On Preparing Versatile Egg Dishes

The average American eats 400 eggs a year. Whether boiled, scrambled, fried or combined with other foods, the uses of eggs for any meal are almost unlimited.

"In any case," the Chef observed, "cook eggs at the lowest possible degree of temperature that will make them coagulate or become firm."

AN EXCEPTION
"When cooked too fast, the food-value is often impaired because valuable egg-vitamins are denatured and protein is made indigestible," I added. "Boiled eggs are the only exception. When cooked a short time in rapidly boiling water protein will not be overcooked or the vitamins affected."

"Immediately immerse in cold water to prevent further cooking and to make shelling easy."

TOMORROW'S DINNER
Chopped Mushroom Soup
Eggs Tetrazzini
Sliced Tomato-Cucumber Salad
Green Mayonnaise
Deep-Dish Rhubarb Pie
Coffee Tea Milk

All measurements are level; recipes for 4 to 6.
Chopped Mushroom Soup: Sauté 2 tbsp. each minced onion and green pepper in 1 1/2 tsp. butter until limp.

Add 2 tsp. rice and 1/4 c. chopped fresh mushrooms and stems. Stir in 1 qt. boiling chicken stock or 2 (10 1/2-oz.) cans condensed chicken broth and 1/2 cans bouillon water.

Add 1/2 c. diced celery, 1/4 tsp. salt, a few grains mace and 1/2 tsp. white pepper.

Simmer-boil until celery and rice are tender.

Garnish with chopped parsley; pass toasted French bread.

Eggs Tetrazzini: Cook 8-oz. spaghetti according to pkg. directions. Drain.

Meanwhile prepare the following sauce: Melt 1/4 c. butter or margarine.

Add 1 c. diced celery, 2 tsp.

chopped parsley and 1 crushed, peeled small section garlic. Simmer 5 min. Do not brown.

Blend in 1 tsp. flour. Add 1 1/2 c. milk all at once; cook - stir until thickened.

Add 1/4 lb. diced sharp Cheddar cheese, 2 tsp. Worcester sauce and 1/2 tsp. sherry flavoring (optional). Stir until cheese melts. Keep warm.

Meantime hard-cook 8 eggs. Cut in eighths or quarters; set aside several pieces for garnish; add balance to the sauce with 1/2 tsp. salt.

Heat to serving temperature; do not boil.

Spread the spaghetti in a heated, large, deep bowl. Pour Tetrazzini sauce over it.

Garnish with reserved hard-cooked egg pieces, sliced stuffed olives and grated cheese.

CHEF'S GREEN MAYONNAISE
To 1 c. mayonnaise, add 1/4 c. chopped parsley, 1/4 c. fine-chopped tender spinach leaves and 1/4 c. scallions chopped with 1" of the green tops.

Stir in 1/2 tsp. minced fresh or 1/4 tsp. powdered dill. Beat thoroughly by hand or leave in the blender for 1 min.

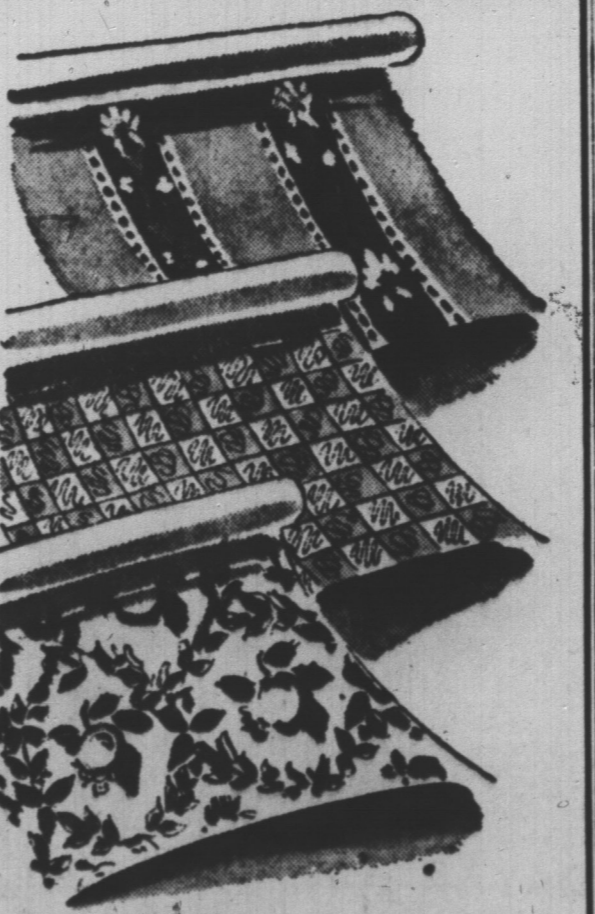
