S'side Board Of Trade Holds Monthly Meeting

-At the regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade held on Thursday evening, a report of the meeting of the council of the board which was held on March 29th was taken up. At this meeting a delegation from the Community Concert Association was present and requested the assistance of the board in the purchase of a grand piano to be used by the Association and also by the music director of the high school in the training of pupils for the musical festival. It was felt that the funds now held in trust by the board under the Fox Education Committee could be used for this purpose.

Following the discussion that arose, a motion was passed that the board regretfully decline the suggestion that the board vote a portion or all of the funds of the Fox Education Committee for the purchase of a grand piano, due to the original nature of the funds and that it was held in trust by the Board.

A further motion was passed that if the Community Concert Association canvass to be held in town, is successful, and if the grand piano is purchased by the Association, that the balance of the music committee account, originating from the sale of a piano, one owned by the board, be donated to the Association to help in the purchase of a grand piano. The action of the council on both these matters was ratified by the meeting on Thursday night.

At this same meeting of the council Mr. Clarence Mercer, supervisor of the Summerside High School, was in attendance and brought a suggestion that the Board of Trade study the possibility of forming a revolving scholarship fund whereby graduate students from grade 12 might borrow from the fund a set amount of money to assist in their education.

At the regular meeting on Thursday night, the president appointed Mr. R. S. Hinton as chairman of a committee whose duty it was to consider whether these funds can be used for this purpose and if so to draw up regulations regarding the administration of the fund. The board decided to recommend to the town council that coronation day be fittingly observed. It was felt by the members that this historic event should be celebrated in a manner that would reflect credit on the town of Summerside.

Mr. John Mungall as chairman of the committee to investigate why the bus service to Bequete had been discontinued by the I.M.T., said that he had been informed by officials of the company that due to the fact that the route was not paying it had been terminated.

The president, Mr. Alan Holman, stated that the Tourist Bureau at Read's Corner would again be in operation this coming summer and that grant from the provincial government would be forthcoming to assist in the upkeep and running of the bureau. Mr. Holman on behalf of the Board, expressed his appreciation to the government for this financial assistance.

It was decided that the May meeting of the board would be a dinner meeting held at Robsons Restaurant and that the board avail itself of the opportunity to procure the Watson James, chairman safety traffic committee, Maritime Provinces Board of Trade as the guest speaker for the occasion. May 4th was the tentative date decided on provided it would be convenient for Mr. James to come at that time.

Mr. Kenneth Bell brought up the matter of having the white line painted on the highway as a safety measure for night driving. Mr. Bell pointed out that this white line has been painted on the new sections of the pavement but nothing has been done on the old parts. The secretary was instructed to write the proper authorities regarding this matter.—S.

Continued from page 1 one of the troubles was that when the price is too high it sets up a consumer resistance. He agreed that all the farmers should pay the fee. Mr. George Saville, Fifth King's, stated as far as seed stock was concerned the Potato Board might have some influence but he did not believe they could exercise much where tablestock is concerned. He said if we stopped growing potatoes altogether the seed would soon be growing somewhere and the same would happen as in the case of the fox industry.

He thought the farmers should be willing to put up the money to support the idea but he also believed the Marketing Board should "get down to business" and report conditions to the farmers at least once a week. Hon. Keir Clark said the prosperity of the Province depends on the farmers and he would support the amendment if there was a clear vote. He said he was not against the Act, just the price fixing activities which had turned into a fiasco. He had earlier stated that only 2,200 growers of 8,000 had paid the license. Airmen Included

Fifteen airmen, headed by Squadron Leader Sylvia Evans of Edmonton, are included in the group sailing from Canada. Also included are 30 members of Air Force flying and group Auxiliary units across Canada. R. C. A. F. personnel bound from Canada for the Coronation will assemble at R.C.A.F. Station Rockcliffe, just outside Ottawa in late April and early May, and will go from there to Valcartier Army Camp, for embarkation from Quebec City. On arrival in Britain they will be based with Canadian Navy and Army Coronation personnel at Firby Army Camp, outside London, where they will train for their ceremonial duties. The Air Force service-women will be quartered at nearby Richmond Park.

All of the Coronation group proper from Canada will march in the parade, and with them will be the airmen drawn from overseas bases. The remainder of the group drawn from the overseas bases will act as street-liners. A four-man administrative team from Canada will accompany the Air Force marching contingent when it leaves Canada.
