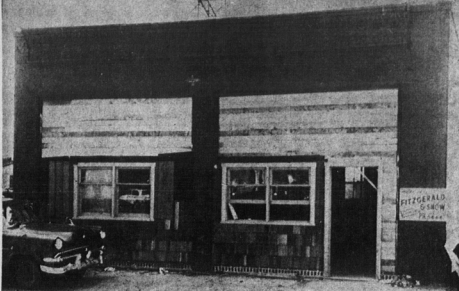


Camping Enjoyed By S' side Packs

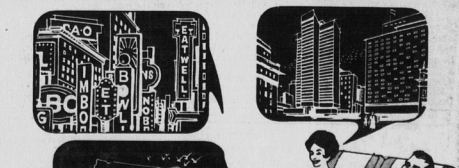
