Three Items Are Handled At Town Council Session

A special meeting of the Summerside Town Council Saturday afternoon authorized the final transaction in the three-way property deal (\$10,000 for 14 feet) between the Town, Steadmans Ltd., and the MacArthur estate.

The meeting also cleared the way for the construction of a 20-unit, \$100,000 motel by Charles Linkletter, and agreed that the tourist trade is an industry but that applications for tax exemptions up to \$100 which may be granted to new industries must first be newspaper advertised by the applicant before being considered by the council.

The first matter dealt with at the meeting resulted in authorization for the preparation and execution of legal documents necessary to the transaction involving the purchase of approximately 14 feet of land from Steadmans Ltd., its transfer to the ownership of the MacArthur estate, and the transfer by this estate of an equal amount of land on Summer Street to the town, who will use their portion of the land to widen this street.

Councillor Clark said he would

be glad to support the resolution chiefly because it should expedite the work of clearing up this area on Water and Summer Streets. He said he felt that the owners would now do something in this regard.

Mayor Currie said that in recent telephone discussions with Steadmans Ltd. in Toronto he mentioned the desirability of having this done. He said he understood they intended to start building in September and would do something in the meantime to make the site more presentable. He said he believed the MacArthur estate wished to begin right away.

Town manager Joseph Brophy said he understood Mrs. MacArthur had been informed by Steadmans that a representative of their company would be here before the second week of June to verify location and size of their proposed new building.

Councillor W. E. MacCausland explained that the essence of the resolution, which he had introduced, was to give authority to the town solicitor to proceed with the finalization of the property transactions.

letter, requesting an exemption of \$100 in the matter of taxation, as provided for in the incorporation act for new industries coming into the town.

This section of the act, on the request of Councillor Clark was read to the council, stated that by an amendment of 1905 the Summerside Town Incorporation Act was amended by the following clauses: "It shall be lawful for the Town Council by a two-thirds vote of the members thereof, to grant exemption from taxation to new industries coming into the town, and not in existence at the time the application for exemption is made, for such a period, to such extent, and upon such terms and conditions as the council shall determine upon, or if the council shall deem it in the interests of the town, to give a yearly bonus by way of encouragement to any such industry they are hereby authorized to do so to any amount not exceeding the yearly sum of \$100, and if such amount exceeding that sum, it shall be approved of at any meeting of the tax payers of the said town, all of that purpose, but provided always that such applicants of exemption or bonus duly advertise the particular nature of the industry proposed to be introduced, for the space of three consecutive weeks at least, in some one or more newspapers published in the town of Summerside, so that any rate payer of the said town may enter a protest to the Town Clerk against the granting of such exemptions. (2) No application for such exemptions shall be considered by the council unless such advertisement has been published as aforesaid, proof of which shall be the production of such newspapers containing such advertisement."

BUILDING PERMIT
The second matter dealt with by the council was a letter from Charles Linkletter requesting a building permit to erect a 20 unit motel situated on the west side of central street in Summerside on a property commonly known as the former Nurses Home property.

Councillor Leo Wood said he felt this would be a nice addition for this part of town, and felt the council should not hesitate in granting the permit to erect a motel, which he said he understood would be a \$100,000 building.

Councillor Dr. H.E. Clark explained that the point to be decided by the council was the fact that this lot of land was in the residential area of the town, and it required only the action of the council to grant a special permit to build what might be termed a commercial establishment in a residential district. He said that according to the zoning by-laws the site of the proposed motel was bisected by the line which divides the residential from the commercial. He noted that other councils had granted special permits for various building activities, and felt the present council was justified in granting the special permit required for the motel.

UNANIMOUS APPROVAL
The resolution, moved by Councillor Fred L.D. Arsenault, and unanimously approved by the council, stated that "the commercial zone between Market Street and North Market Street, on the west side of Central Street, be extended to include all the land now known as the former Nurses Home for the purpose of erecting thereon a motel, the plans location, design of which, must meet the approval of the Town Council.

The third matter dealt with by the council concerned a letter from Mr. Neil R. MacLeod, attorney for Mr. Charles Link-
