

Mr. John Morley and the New Liberal Government.

The following from the leading article in the *Pall Mall Gazette* of Monday shows that one advanced Liberal, at least, is not quite satisfied either with the formation of the Government or with its policy as announced. The *Pall Mall Gazette* says:—

Only a few days ago we saw the formation of what looked like the strongest Government of our generation. The majority in the House of Commons was greater than Sir Robert Peel's in 1841, and almost as great as Earl Grey's in 1832. The general feeling of the country was confident and enthusiastic. The Minister who wielded this majority is the most experienced commanding statesman in the House of Commons. What has happened? The ink on the patents appointing the Ministers is hardly dry before the Ministers' brows become clouded with anxiety. Elation has changed into very marked discomfort. Old members of the House of Commons declare that so disagreeable a condition of things has never before been known. The Opposition, instead of being cowed and modest, are fierce, bitter and pertinacious. Flouts, gibes and sneers are launched upon the Ministers, as if they were on the eve of defeat and not on the morrow of victory. On their own benches there is a curious feeling of uneasiness, perplexity and disappointment. There is loyalty and zeal in unexampled strength, but for the moment it looks rather like loyalty balked and zeal in the air. Before the working session was a week old a mutinous round robin had, in a few hours, been signed by more than a fourth of the party. The mutineers were by no means confined to the regulation malcontents below the gangway, but sprang from all sections of the party. Outside of Parliament it is undeniable that the same clouds have arisen. A chill has come upon men's minds—a sense of check, chagrin and suspicion that the chiefs they have placed in power may not after all have understood the wishes and intentions of those who placed them there. The peril of the Cabinet lies in the fact that it was not formed to match that spirit in the country which made a Liberal Government possible. Its predominant color is not the predominant color of the party. This is the real secret of the present uncomfortable and unsafe position of affairs. For the present everybody will be anxious to make the best of things. More careful attention to the real significance of the elections and a vigorous and resolute adherence to principle may soon restore more genial relations. If not, we shall have the vexation of seeing the opportunity which might have marked a really great expansion of liberalism degraded into a mere shifting of position in eternal seesaw of inns and outs.

THE RIFLE.

82nd Battalion.

The 2nd monthly shooting match of No. 3 (Captain Longworth's) Company of the 82nd Battalion, Royal Canadian Militia, for the company's silver medal, was completed yesterday afternoon, at the Kensington Range. The ranges were 200, 500 and 600 yards, seven shots at each, with one sighting shot. Captain F. S. Longworth was again successful, winning the medal the second time, with a score of 72. The weather was very unfavorable, and at the long range (owing to the ever varying and gusty winds) it was impossible to secure a high score. The medal is of a design and pattern quite handsome, and we are inclined to think that the good shots of Captain Longworth's Company had better look to their laurels else they may find in him a steady marksman hard to overcome. We are authorized to state that the third monthly competition for the medal, will be on Thursday, the first of July, and should the day prove unfavorable, on the following Monday.

In this connection we are pleased to perceive a rifle butt in course of erection at Kensington Range, at the distance of 800 yards, thus for the first time affording a fair opportunity to our Island riflemen of practising with the Martini-Henry and other small bore long range rifles. This supplies a want long felt by our marksmen, and although a late one, is an appreciated advantage. Gradually, we think, our active militia may enjoy advantages for years past taken as matters of course in the sister provinces of the Dominion.

A BOGUS MARRIAGE NOTICE.—The *K. C. Advertiser* says: We are extremely sorry to learn that some malignant scoundrel has perpetrated another of those periodical outrages inflicted on society, by sending us a bogus marriage notice of Mr. Angus McLean, of Black Bush, Lot 46,—which we published two years ago. The notice in question was the work of some malicious creature, who will, in all probability, suffer the penalty incurred sooner than he expects. It would be a fearful thing if such fiends were not detected and drummed out of the country. By publishing this contradiction, such of our contemporaries as have published the notice referred to, will only accord simple justice to a highly respectable man.
