More Impaired Charges Heard

Two more impaired driving cases appeared in Magistrate James B. Johnston's court yesterday before a charge of driving a motor vehicle without due care and attention, had his case adjourned to July 31 to fix a date for trial.

John Robert MacDonald of Cornwall pleaded not guilty to the charge and was remanded to court on August 5 to fix a date for trial.

A charge of operating a still brought in by Constable J. Brown in the district of Mermaid, into court. He was remanded by consent on August 7 for plea.

THREE YOUTH APPEAR

Three Charlottetown youths appeared again on their cases of break, entry, and theft, with which they were charged in court last week. Melvin Alvin Jackson was remanded by consent to August 3, as was Richard Derrell Casford.

Stewart Gajdos, Ferguson, under representation by Allison Gillis, applied for re-election of his bail. The application was granted and Ferguson elected trial by judge and jury, instead of his original election of trial by magistrate.

His bail was fixed at \$500, and then Ferguson was remanded by consent to jail until August 3 to fix a date for preliminary hearing.

Alan Crichton Holman of Charlottetown, who had already entered a plea of not guilty to a charge of driving a motor vehicle without due care and attention, had his case adjourned to July 31 to fix a date for trial.

POOR EQUIPMENT

Edward Brown of Charlottetown, charged with operating a motor vehicle on the highway without proper equipment, had his case adjourned until Monday.

A Mr. O'Brien appeared in court for Brown, but the magistrate was unwilling to accept his proxy after leaving the same office involving the same vehicle only a week before. A plea of guilty was entered by O'Brien for Brown, but the magistrate demanded the appearance of Brown in person on Monday.

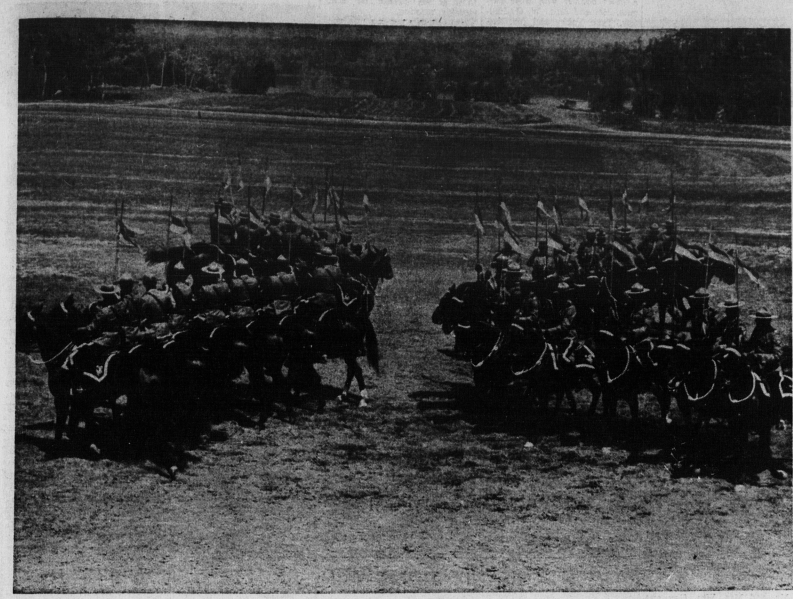
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RCMP MUSICAL RIDE PERFORMS DIFFICULT STAR PATTERN

This maneuver by the RCMP's Musical Ride is one of the most difficult formations riding in the program. Called the "star," it demands perfect response and timing by the horses and riders, which are divided into four lines of eight. They stretch out to form the points of a star and then rotate about the centre. Charlottetown's Driving Park will be the scene tonight and Monday of the colorful show. Robichaud Is Youngest; Shaw Oldest Premier

Louis J. Robichaud, premier of New Brunswick and Walter E. Shaw, premier of Prince Edward Island, are two of six Canadian premiers to receive honorary Doctor of Laws degrees today at St. Dunstan's University in a special Centennial Convocation beginning at 4 p.m.

These two premiers represent the youngest, in the person of Mr. Robichaud, and the oldest statesman, in Mr. Shaw, among Canadian provincial heads. Mr. Robichaud is 39, Mr. Shaw 78.

Others to receive degrees are Ontario's John P. Robarts, Quebec's Jean Lesage, Nova Scotia's Robert L. Stanfield, and Newfoundland's Joseph R. Smallwood.

Mr. Robichaud was born in St. Anthony, N.B., and was a graduate of Sacred Heart University and Laval University where he received his bachelor of arts degree in 1949.

He was first elected to the N.B. Legislature in 1952, and re-elected in 1956, 1960, and 1963.

LEADER IN '58

He became leader of the Liberal opposition party in 1958, and was sworn in as premier after his party was returned to power in the election of 1960.

Mr. Shaw was born at West River in 1888. He was educated at Prince of Wales College, Truro Agricultural College, and the University of Toronto, graduating from Toronto with a bachelor's degree in scientific agriculture.

He then returned to Prince Edward Island and began a distinguished career in the field of agriculture.

Mr. Shaw was the pioneer promoter of junior farm clubs on the island and for several years directed the federal-provincial youth training program. He was also responsible for the establishment of the P.E.I. Federation of Agriculture.

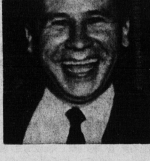
HONORED BY ROYALTY

He was named deputy minister of agriculture in 1934, a position he held until his retirement in 1964. For his outstanding work in his native province, Mr. Shaw was decorated by Royalty on three occasions: a Jubilee Medal in 1935, an MBE and Citation in 1959, and, recently, a Coronation Medal.

Mr. Shaw entered politics shortly after his retirement as a civil servant, and was named leader of the P.E.I. Progressive Conservative party in 1957.

He led his party to a decisive victory in 1959 when he became premier, and was re-elected in 1962.

Premier Shaw will deliver the address on behalf of the honorary graduates at today's ceremonies at S.D.U. The Convocation exercises are open to the public.

Noted Montague Citizen Dies

MONTAGUE — The death occurred yesterday in the Kings County Memorial Hospital of Mrs. Gladstone Higginbotham of Montague in her 89th year.

The late Mrs. Higginbotham was born in Murray Harbor North, the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Edward and Sofia Irving. Following her marriage she spent her entire life in Montague where she was active in church and community affairs, a well known and much respected citizen.

Her husband predeceased her in 1951. She leaves to mourn six sons and two daughters. They are: Alfred in Fortune; Lewis in Charlottetown; Harry in Halifax; Lloyd in Charlottetown; Archie in Montague; Lorne in Lower Montague; Elsie (Mrs. Gordon Meyers) New Perth; Caroline (Mrs. Lawrence Irving) in Picton, N.S.

The remains are resting at Montague Funeral Home. Funeral services will be held from Father's Road Presbyterian Church, Sunday, July 26 at 2 p.m. with interment in Peter's Road cemetery.

Francis De Sales Church Celebrates Anniversary

MONTAGUE — Sunday, the parishioners and former parishioners of St. Francis De Sales Church at Little Pond will gather to celebrate the 100th anniversary of their church.

Over 100 years ago the residents of this small settlement decided they needed a church of their own and in early spring cut the lumber for the building. Their spare time during the summer was spent in erecting the church and in the fall, although not fully completed, it was ready for the coming of the bishop.

When Bishop MacInnes arrived in November it was found that an article necessary to the blessing of the church had been left at his residence in Charlottetown. "Big Donnie" MacDonald volunteered to get the necessary item, and, jumping on his horse, rode to Charlottetown via Head of Hillsboro, as there was no Hillsboro bridge at this time, and was back at Little Pond before daylight. It was a distance of some 125 miles.

On that morning Bishop MacInnes blessed the church and dedicated it to St. Francis De Sales. Rev. Donald MacDonald offered the first mass in the new church.

ATTACHED TO ST. GEORGE'S

At this time the church was attached to St. George's parish with Rev. Francis MacDonald as parish priest. A few years later it was attached to Roman Bay parish as a mission and then returned as a mission to St. George's.

Over 30 years ago St. Francis De Sales became a mission attached to St. Charles parish and since that time regular Sunday masses and other services have been held there. He present pastor of the church is Rev. Charles Gallant.

Many religious vocations have been fostered in this small mission and among those native to the parish are: Rev. Bernard MacDonald, now deceased; Very Rev. George A. MacDonald, rector of St. Dunstan's University; Rev. W.D. Macdon-

Critical reviews of the Opera Company's last winter tour were unanimously enthusiastic, and the same reception is hoped for here in Charlottetown.
