For the first time in the past two or three weeks, fine weather blessed a large and varied program of sporting activity both here and at Summerside over the week-end that came up with some really exciting entertainment. There was something featured to suit the fancy of practically every sports lover, with baseball, horse racing and golf being the highlight features on the program.

They were all action-packed events, too. The horseracing was something worth seeing, when commencing Friday night and concluding Saturday, the two-night Mid-Summer Meet at the Exhibition Track, gave thousands of ardent racing fans some of the keenest and definitely the fastest racing to be witnessed over Island raceways this season.

Performing over a track that could be termed nothing short of "perfect," the amazing total of 130 entries saw action in nineteen one-mile dash events during the twin racing bill that produced everything in the way of excellent racing entertainment. Although the winning horses were too numerous to mention here, the two leading horses in the speed department were Babe Britton and Yankee Girl. The Babe, owned by George Thompson of Summerside and driven by Lt.-Col. D. A. MacKinnon, paced her way to the fastest time of the meet on Friday night, covering the mile distance in 2:12, while Yankee Girl of the John A. Forbes stables, Fredericton, N. B., driven by Frank McAlduff, was just a fifth of a second slow of that mark on Saturday's final program.

In golfing circles, Ted Bradley was the big winner of the first stage play of the MacKinnon Cup Match played over the Belvedere course on Saturday afternoon. Ted stroked his way to a gross 87 for a net 65 over a field of 20 golfers. The win gives him a points total of 10 for the initial lead of the three stage, total point competition, which is followed closely by F. B. Conrad and Don Clarke with nine and eight points respectively.

The baseball program was one that as far as actual games played is concerned, was one of the most extensive that has taken place in a good number of years, if not the largest, with seven games being played during Saturday and Sunday. It was a doubleheader Junior League feature here at Memorial Field yesterday, when the Knights of Columbus bounced into the league leadership with a clean sweep of both ends of the bill over the Victorias. The Knights walloped the Vics by scores of 5-2 and 5-1.

Summerside was the scene of the lion's share of the activities, a total of five games being run off. A junior exhibition took place there on Saturday between the Junior Curran and Briggs nine and the Charlottetown K. of C. and the same western capital club took part in a doubleheader fixture with the Dieppe Junior Club, champions of New Brunswick, and the R.C.A.F. Royals played a double bill with Men's Falcons in Island League competition, as special Sunday afternoon attractions.

Western capital teams were also the big winners, taking three wins out of the total five games, while Falcons captured honors in the other two. The C. and B. juniors trounced the K. of C. in the Saturday tilt, by a 13-2 lopsided victory, while both the senior and junior teams of the same club took verdicts of 3-2 and 6-4 from the New Brunswickers. Falcons downed R. C. A. F. in both ends of their double fixture by counts of 7-6 and 12-5.

According to reports from officials of the Provincial Exhibition Association and Charlottetown Driving Park, horseracing fans are going to get more night racing than was originally scheduled at the start of the season. Following on from last week-end's mid-summer meet, night racing will be witnessed again on Friday and Saturday of this week, and is expected to be continued as such for

Smart Racing Climax To Mid-Summer Meet Seen By Large Crowd

It was another large crowd of enthusiastic racing fans that witnessed the final program of the two-night mid-summer harness racing meet, held over the Exhibition Raceway on Saturday, that was an exciting climax to some really top-notch racing and added another success in the record books for the Provincial Exhibition Association and the Charlottetown Driving Park, the sponsors of the meet.

One of the two double winners of the night, Lee Brewer C., owned and driven by Emmett Bernard of Hunter River, lived up to his former reputation as a trotter of many surprises and powerful performances when he clipped off firsts in the fourth and eighth races over a strong six-horse field. The Brewer went out in front early on both occasions to build up long leads which although cut down by the time the finish wire was in the rest of the field, he came within three fifths of a second of the best time of the night with a mark of 2:12 4/5 in winning the fourth event.

Quick Lick, driven by Len O'Meara, also came up with top performances in the third and seventh events for straight wins to be the other big double event winner of the night. They were real races, however, that made Quick Lick give with everything in order to win after terrific battles with Billy Conn and Eleanor G., who finished second and third respectively in driving finishes in both races.

John A. Forbes' entry from Fredericton, N. B., Yankee Girl, came through with the fastest mile of the night, 2:12 1/5, in her winning of the fifth event on the nine, one-mile dash program, and miss out by one fifth of a second in equalling the fastest time of the two-night meet. That honor went to George Thompson's Babe Britton when she chalked up a 2:12 in Friday night's opening program. Yankee Girl was driven by Frank McAlduff.

With the same field competing in the final event on the card, Claude O'Brien piloted Dale B. in a winner for owner George Hughes of Brackley. Dale B. also had a close second behind Yankee Girl in the fifth, with Billy McVey placing a 3-2 summary in the two contests.

Other events on the card saw Billy Aubrey take a first in the second race with Baron and Wait N' See placing second and third respectively, while in the sixth Feather Duster came through for the dash honors with the Baron and Wait N' See again placing in the same order.

Joandale, driven by James Arbing, won the opening race of the night by topping out an eight-horse field, with Miss Judy Dale taking the place position and Winnie's Last showing.
