## "Plus Fifty" Folk Versatile Sitters

**TORONTO—(CP)**—Are you over 50 and a bit bored with life? If so, you might try joining Toronto's plus/fifty club that makes a practice of tackling odd assignments.

The 360 club members—all women of 50 or over—help supplement their incomes by playing baby sitters to dogs; sleeping in empty houses, and arguing with elderly people on purpose.

The club, formed six years ago, is the outgrowth of the baby sitters club, reg'd., founded by the same group of women. The baby sitters found they were being swamped with calls that had nothing to do with either babies or sitting. So they decided to form a second group.

Mrs. Olga I. Lee, secretary of both clubs, says the plus fifties get some very odd assignments.

"One client wanted us to get some one to look after his Great Dane while he was away on holidays. The dog was very temperamental so a person had to be picked who liked dogs and vice-versa."

Another popular request during the summer months is for "house sitters" to sleep in vacant houses while the owners are away—just so they'll be less inviting to burglars.

### Must Be Recommended

Qualifications for membership in the plus fifty club come pretty high.

"We are most particular about our staff," says Mrs. Lee. "Only refined, educated and personable women are chosen. They all have to be recommended to us by a clergyman or some other reliable person."

The club, in turn, is choosy about the chores its members undertake. Only calls from desirable districts are accepted and if the client doesn't sound suitable, he or she is politely told: "Sorry, but we are too busy to help you at the moment."

Mrs. Lee estimates that three or four per cent of all requests made to the club are turned down this way.

One of the latest ventures of the club is a lending library for shut-ins.

"You'd be surprised how very interested old ladies are in mystery stories," says Mrs. Lee. "The more bloodcurdling the better."

As for the baby sitters club, no woman under 40 is permitted to join. Mrs. Lee believes it isn't a job for younger people.

"Youngsters haven't the necessary balance for an emergency, whereas a woman with experience, one who perhaps has brought up children of her own, acts automatically when any trouble arises."

### PARATHION TESTED

Science Service workers in the Division of Animal Pathology, Canada Department of Agriculture, have found that the new insecticide parathion, presents far greater hazards of poisoning to domestic animals than does DDT. Cattle, sheep, goats and swine were all tested and it was found

that the amount of parathion required to produce toxicity was about the same in each species. This suggests that the susceptibility of man will be approximately the same as that of the animals studied.

### DISEASE OF SLED DOGS

Epidemics among sled dogs in the Canadian Arctic have been investigated by Science Service workers in the Division of Animal Pathology, Canada Department of Agriculture, and it has been shown that wild animals are the reservoirs for the rabies disease and that dogs become infected from this source.
