

**Attacked by Weasels.**

THE REMARKABLE EXPERIENCE OF A NORTHERN PENNSYLVANIA FARMER.

OLEAN, March 18.—Delos Lante, an Elk county farmer, had been annoyed greatly this winter by weasels in his poultry yard and houses, the blood-thirsty little animals having killed his fowls by the score, and defied all efforts to trap them. On Saturday Mr. Lante was walking through a stony field on his farm, and saw a weasel run into a big heap of stones piled loosely in the middle of the field. He had a walking stick, and, going to the stone pile, began to throw down stones to get at the weasel or scare it out. Presently a weasel jumped out, and he struck at it with his cane. It did not run away, but sprang at Lante's throat—the spot a weasel instinctively tries to seize. The farmer struck at it again and hit it, but it returned gamely to the attack, and whether in answer to a signal or not the farmer does not know, weasels began to swarm out of the stone pile on all sides, and in a second were springing upon Lante, climbing nimbly up his clothes, trying to reach his face. They bit him with their sharp teeth, and finding that he would be unable to keep the savage little blood-suckers from fastening their teeth in his neck without help, he shook them off as best he could and started at the top of his speed for home. The weasels followed him until he scaled the fence. His hands were bleeding from a dozen wounds, and if he had remained to fight the weasels they would have undoubtedly have overpowered and killed him. In the afternoon Mr. Lante returned to the stone pile with two men, two guns, and a dog. They routed out the weasels and killed thirty—a colony which had been devastating the entire neighborhood for a year and more.

**An Extraordinary Man.**

An extraordinary colored man, says the Woodstock, N. B., Times, has been exhibiting himself around town during the past few days. He claims to have two hearts, one on each side of the lungs, and from the pulsations on each side of the body a good many people believe his assertions. He has also two complete sets of ribs, one over the other and both movable. Endowed with more organs than the ordinary run of mortals, he appears to be gifted with almost superhuman strength, as he can lift 300 pounds with one hand, and can bend a rod of iron, three-quarters of an inch thick, by striking it on his bare arm, and two strong men could not bend the iron into its original shape.

**Liquor Shipments.**

Liquor is shipped from Baltimore to points in local-option counties in the State under many *nom de plumes*. Sometimes it is marked sea foam, extract of malt, hard-tack, horse shoes and spike nails. Sometimes a keg or half barrel of whiskey is sent in a hogshead of crockery. "I have been shipping whiskey this winter under every conceivable name," remarked a steamboat clerk yesterday, "but when it comes to me marked sewing machines, as this package shows, it knocks me out. Lemon syrup and turpentine are the favorite brands among the hundred or so disguises adopted, but sewing machines is a new wrinkle."—*Baltimore Sun*.

**A Puzzling Case.**

Sonnie Hall, aged fifteen years, died a few days ago, at Akron Ohio, and was buried on the 18th inst. It was learned that she had lived seventy-five days without partaking of food, except a very small quantity of orange once or twice a week and occasionally a swallow of water. She had eaten no solid food since last New Year's Day. Soon after the 1st of January the deceased fell into a stupor, from which she awoke once in a while for a short time only. When a child she fell from a high chair and sustained injuries to her back, but had been in fairly good health since then. The physicians are puzzled over the case.

The Canadian Pacific Line will be completed from Montreal to Winnipeg direct within the next three weeks. 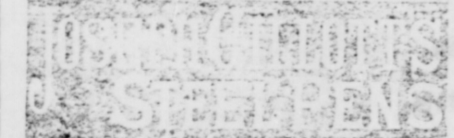

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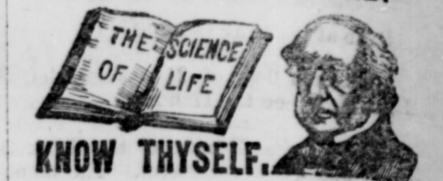
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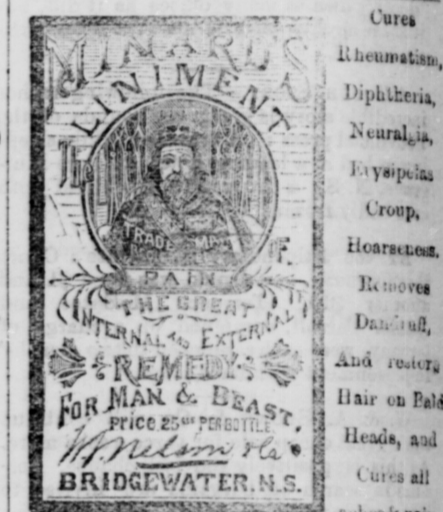
