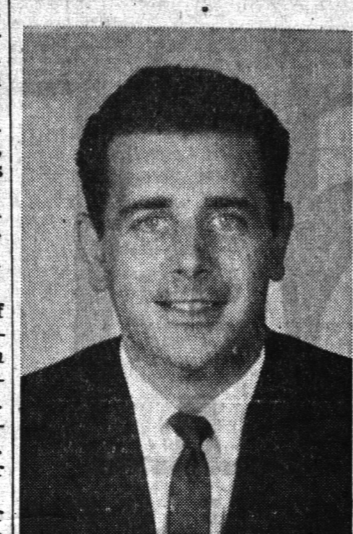

3rd Kings Conservatives Nominate Two Candidates

CARDIGAN — Douglas McGowan and Thomas Curran of Baldwin's Road will carry the colors of the Progressive Conservative party in the third district of Kings at the next provincial general election.

Both men were nominated at a district convention held here last night.

The area's eleven polls were represented by a full slate of fifty-five delegates which included four ladies.

Automobile and implement dealer Douglas McGowan will seek election as Councillor while his running mate, Thomas Curran, will try for the Assemblyman's seat.

Prior to his name being placed on the ballot, Mr. Curran acted as chairman of the convention. He was succeeded by Mr. Albert Acorn of Primrose. Mrs. Malcolm MacLeod of Lorne Valley was secretary.

Mr. McGowan's nomination was proposed by Mr. James Donahoe, Roseneath, seconded

by Mr. Bruce MacPhee, Montague and supported by Mr. Louis Cantelo, Cardigan.

Other nominees for Councillor were Mr. Leslie Hunter, Bridgetown, moved by Mr. John MacPhee, Montague, seconded by Mr. Frank Fogarty, Cardigan and supported by Mr. Earl Keith, Montague; and Mr. Cyrus Shaw, Montague, moved by William Hatton, Lorne Valley, seconded by Mr. Joe Kelly, Bangor.

Mr. Curran's nomination was proposed by Albert Wood, Dundas, seconded by James Cain, New Perth, and supported by Lloyd Mellish, Union Road. Mr. Richard Curley, second nominee for Assemblyman, was moved by J. S. MacDonald, Cardigan, seconded by Earl Hayden, Martinville, supported by Cyril Shaw, Brudenell.

Mr. John A. Macdonald and Mr. Heath Macquarrie, Federal representatives for Kings and Queens, respectively, Mr. Wal-

ter R. Shaw, Provincial leader of the Progressive Conservative party, Mr. R. R. Bell, and Mr. Melvin MacQuaid were also in attendance. Each addressed the meeting briefly.

Two delegates, J. S. MacDonald of Cardigan, and William Hatton of Lorne Valley, also spoke.

Both Mr. McGowan and Mr. Curran pledged their support to the provincial leader, Mr. W. R. Shaw, and thanked the delegates for their confidence and support.
