Annual Council Meeting

S' side Reports \$27,093 Surplus

A surplus of \$27,093.55 for the 1954 fiscal year ending December 31st was shown in the report of the finance committee of the Summerside Town Council at its annual meeting last evening.

The report submitted by Councillor W. E. Jenkins, chairman of the committee, showed revenue for the year was \$337,156.03, against expenditure of \$310,062.48. The net bonded debt of the town according to the report tabled by Councillor Jenkins stands at \$1,155,551.

Commenting on the surplus Mayor Henry Wedge said it appeared to be the largest of any year since he has been associated with the council.

He noted too that 97 percent of the property taxes have been collected, and 88 percent of the poll taxes. All councillors were present last evening and each reported for the committee of which he is chairman.

With a net revenue of \$15,614.37 the statement of the water and sewerage department showed gross revenue of \$36,132.41, against an expenditure of \$20,518.04.

The electric light department showed a net revenue of \$33,579.96, with a gross revenue of \$41,727.05, and expenditure of \$8,147.09. In his report Councillor Jenkins said in part: "From the statements of revenue and expenditures provided it will be seen that we provided for sinking fund purposes \$81,997.47; paid interest on debentures \$50,040.15 and bank interest \$11,520.03, a total of \$123,557.65.

"This means that it takes about 75 percent of our tax assessments to provide carrying charges on bonded debt and bank overdraft. We are, however, in a happy position by owning our electric light plant, the revenue from which has provided about 50 percent of the carrying charges, while the water and sewerage department again this year showed results favourable to last year.

The net bonded debt of the town as at December 31st, 1954 is \$1,155,551. During 1954, \$124,500 of our debentures were paid in 1955 debentures will mature amounting to \$45,500 and these are fully provided for in sinking fund and will be paid in full.

"Total revenue from all sources was \$337,156.03. Total expenditures were \$310,062.48. Leaving a net surplus for 1954, \$27,093.55, after providing all necessary depreciation and without any increase in the tax rate.

"From this it will be seen that the town is in a sound financial position and this fact is realized by financial circles which was evidenced by the manner in which the town's debentures sold early this year.

Street Report Councillor Andrew Perry, in his report as chairman of the street committee, gave a comprehensive report of rebuilding, patching, graveling, and other work done on streets, and also the construction and replacement of sidewalks, storm sewers and catch basins. The report noted that 22 storm sewers had been built by using the brick from the smoke stack which was dismantled at the old pumping station. He said that \$122,000 had been spent on capital account for streets. The purchase of the new snow plow had been a good investment last year.

Street maintenance in ordinary account including plough, fuel, and repairs, and snow removal amounted to \$35,244.28 this year. Councillor Clarence Steele, reporting for the park and property committee, praised the work accomplished in the care and maintenance of the park grounds.

Councillor Steele reviewed the work and repairs made to the breastwork at the water front at both the east and west ends of the town, and of masonry work done to the old post office, and refacing of brick work on the town hall. He also reported that the library had been redecorated.

Police Report The report of the Chief of Police Peter R. White, which was read by Councillor MacDougall, stated that the department consists of a chief, two sergeants, four constables and one special officer who is the truant officer for the town. Four hundred and four cases came before Ernest H. Strong, Q.C., stipendiary magistrate. Total fines and costs collected for the year was \$8,616.73.

Well Known Alberton Man Passes Away

Mr. H. Waldo Matthews, a well known citizen of Alberton passed away last evening at the age of 70 years. Although he had been in ill-health for some months, death came swiftly at the end.

A son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Matthews, as a young man he became engaged in the fishing industry. He enlisted in the early days of World War I and served with the Canadian Army overseas.

Following his discharge at the cessation of hostilities, he was a partner in Matthew Bros. Store but later returned to fishing. It was as postmaster that he became well known to all residents of the Alberton area.

He was known as an ardent sportsman and took an active interest in the Alberton Branch of the Canadian Legion which he helped to organize. Beside his wife, the former Helen Tanton, he is survived by two sons, Kier Matthews of R. C. A. F. Camp Borden, and Jarvis in Arvida, P.Q.; also one daughter Bessie (Mrs. Ormond L. Dewell) of Seabright, Ont.; six grandchildren and two brothers, Emmanuel in Montreal and John in Edmonton.

Many men and women will share with his family a sense of loss at the departure from their midst of a generous hearted friend. Funeral arrangements have not been completed.

port said, as several cases are pending the appointment of a juvenile judge which position was made vacant by the sudden and untimely death of Judge Lewis. Mr. Leo Wedge, special officer, and veteran of two wars, has charge of all truancy, and he reports that during the year he has found it difficult to keep a certain number in school, but those that are not going to school are the very ones that have charges pending in the juvenile court, and it has made it more difficult on account of the vacancy at the present time of the judge of the juvenile court, the report stated.

The town dump has been well taken care of by the man in charge, but the report recommended that a more permanent road be made. The traffic accidents, which were 114, have been about the same as last year and there were no deaths as a result of motor vehicle accidents in the town.

In the abattoir report, submitted by Councillor MacDougall, revenue was shown as \$6,393. An increase over last year, however, there was still a deficit of \$866 in this department, of which \$414 was for painting and repairs, which included repainting the exterior and interior of the building. During the year the cattle yard was paved with asphalt and some grading done around the property.

The number of animals slaughtered during the year was: Cattle, 1647; canners, 39; veal, 45; sheep and lambs, 267; pork 63 (not slaughtered). Had the rates been increased by 15 percent the revenue would have been about \$1,000 more the report said, which could have been sufficient to show a small surplus.

Consideration of this matter by the new committee was recommended, as was also the purchase of an electric saw, for use at the abattoir. Resolutions were approved by the meeting appointing returning officers, poll clerks, and doorkeepers, for the civic election on February 1st. 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TRY EDUCATE DRIVERS

NEW YORK (AP)—Twenty "pedal drivers" turned up Wednesday night at the opening session of the city traffic court school. The students range from 21 to 50 years of age and include one with a record of 23 traffic violations. They were recommended for the course by magistrates and will receive two hours of instruction on various aspects of safe driving every Wednesday for six weeks.

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FLUORIDATION The matter of fluoridation is being studied by the committee, said Councillor Clark, and every opportunity is taken to advise the public and stimulate their interest in this scientific discovery. Councillor Clark explained the difference between chlorine, which is added to the water to purify it, and which can be tasted, and fluoride, which is tasteless, and which is added to water to aid in dental decay. He said that the latter method had been approved by both the Canadian Dental Society and the Canadian Medical Society.

Councillor James MacDougall in his report as chairman of the police committee, announced the retirement of Constable Joseph Linkletter due to illness. Constable Linkletter has been a member of Summerside Police Department since 1927.

Councillor MacDougall said that the appointment of Judge Darby to act as judge of the juvenile court is now the subject of correspondence with the proper authorities and it was hoped that something will be achieved in this respect in the near future. He said that the installation of a two-way radio system in the police car, pumper of the fire department, and two of the electric light department trucks, with the main transmitting unit being located in the police office, is expected shortly.

During the year street signs were ordered for all streets connecting Spring and Granville. They did not arrive in time to be placed last fall, and this will be done early in the spring. He noted that the fire department is at present below its required strength, but said that applications are being considered for replacements on a probationary basis. One new regulation in the recently approved by-laws is the retirement age of being reduced to 60 years, and
