Conacher Had Brilliant All-Round Athletic Career

Lionel Conacher, who has excelled in many sports but won his most notable sports achievements as the "big train" of football.

And Conacher's career ended on the playing field. He collapsed at the annual softball game between members of Parliament and the Press Gallery at Ottawa Wednesday night and died in hospital soon after. He was 52.

His football prowess in the 1920s, when he played with Toronto Argonauts of the Big Four, and a later comeback career in hockey after it appeared that he was through, won him his greatest accolades in 1950 in a Canadian Press poll of sports greats of the previous 50 years.

Editors and sportscasters across the country gave him a hands-down vote as the outstanding Canadian football player of the half century and named him the greatest Canadian athlete of the same period.

The football ballot gave Conacher almost three times as many votes as his nearest rival, Joe Krol of Toronto Argonauts.

Conacher, at his death Liberal member of Parliament for Toronto Trinity, a successful business man and father of five, thrilled football fans of the 20s when there was no forward pass and the game was fought out on the ground.

His four goals and one assist brought his team from behind to win.

ACE BALL CARRIER

He was one of the most feared ball carriers when he played for his hometown Argos in the old international loop. In one game against Montreal he gained 227 yards.

As a boxer he won the Canadian light heavyweight championship. In 1928 he played baseball for Toronto Maple Leafs, winners of the little world series.

Conacher like Conacher's inevitably brought its toll of injuries. His nose bore the marks of eight fractures and through the years he had more than 600 stitches in his 200-pound, six-foot frame.

After his retirement, the Big Train continued his interest in sports. He was elected to the Ontario legislature for Toronto-Brantford in 1937 and became chairman of the Ontario athletic commission and director of recreation for the RCAF during the war with the honorary rank of squadron leader.

He was elected to the House of Commons at the general election of 1949 and re-elected in 1953.

Chicago Rally In Ninth To Edge Cleveland Indians 5-4

The Chicago White Sox climbed within half a game of the American League lead Wednesday by edging the first place Cleveland Indians 5-4 with a ninth inning rally.

Cass Michaels' hit over the head of centerfielder Larry Doby with the bases loaded and one out, drove in the winning run.

Chicago had built an early 4-2 lead only to have the Indians catch up on a home run by Al Rosen and Joe Ginsburg's first hit of the season, a run scoring triple in the ninth.

Art Houtteman was charged with the loss. He loaded the bases although the final hit came off Hall Newhouser. Sandy Consuegra, who took over from Bob Keegan with one out in the ninth, was the winner.

Baltimore Orioles lost 6-3 to the Detroit Tigers. George Zuverink, one-time property of the Indians and Cleveland, made his first major league start and went the route for the Tigers. Vic Wertz and Sam Mele accounted for all of the Baltimore runs with homers.

The fastest game of the National League season was played at the Polo Grounds where the New York Giants beat Pittsburgh 2-1 in one hour, 49 minutes. MUIRFIELD, Scotland, (AP) - Four Canadians, their ranks unbroken in fourth - round play, reached the round of 32 in the British amateur gold championships Wednesday and prepared for two more matches today against stiffening competition.

The four double winners in Wednesday's play were Walt McElroy of Vancouver, Bob Fleming of Victoria, Gordon B. Taylor of Montreal and Don Doe of Granby, Que.

Doug Silverberg of Red Deer Alta, was less fortunate, losing out at the 19th hole to A. J. Cochran of Scotland in third - round play. He was the sixth of Canada's 10-man contingent to be eliminated.

Joining the four Canadians were the top tournament favorites—defending champion Joe Carr of Ireland, two-time champion Frank Stranahan of Toledo, O., and U. S. Walker Cup star Bill Campbell.

But some of the bigger names were missing. Robert Sweney, the 1937 champion from Palm Beach, Calif., lost a third-round match and veteran Frank Strataci of Garden City, N. Y., dropped a heartbreaker to Peter Toogood, young Australian, after playing seven extra holes.
