Export Rate Clerk Is a B. & P. And IODE Member

Miss M. C. Ritchie of Dartmouth, retired from the C.N.R. June 30th, after 41 years, leaving a vocation she found "most interesting" right to the end. Export rate clerk in the port of Halifax freight office since 1964, Miss Ritchie said she reckoned she learned something new every day. "I really like working with rates and tariffs," she said in an interview. "The work demands a lot of careful attention and you can't afford to make mistakes. But you occasionally do. An error means a lot of work in correcting it." Miss Ritchie is the only member of her sex classed as an export rate clerk in the C.N.R.'s Maritime district. She doesn't think there's anything extraordinary about that. "I don't know of any reason why more women can't do the work," she said. "I suppose you need something of a mathematical mind, though." Senior clerk in the Halifax port office, Miss Ritchie began her career as a freight clerk at Dartmouth in 1918, working on a branch line this ran from Dartmouth to Upper Musquodoboit and Windsor Junction. She worked up to export rate clerk through a variety of positions. "I guess I've done a little bit of everything," she laughed. Miss Ritchie has a clearly delineated program for the next couple of months. "I'm going to have a lovely summer," she said, and I hope we have lots of sun. Then we'll see. I love to travel and I may do a good deal more of it than I have been able to." Life-long Dartmouth resident, Miss Ritchie is a member of the Business and Professional Women's Club there and of H.M.S. Shannon chapter of the I.O.D.E. She is an adherent of the United Church. Her coworkers and friends gathered to mark Miss Ritchie's retirement with a presentation of a gift, made on their behalf by J. A. Salter, general agent at Halifax.

Brian Chandler Will Represent Dalhousie

CHICAGO — Brian "Spud" Chandler, senior medical student at Dalhousie University Faculty of Medicine, Halifax, Nova Scotia, has been chosen as that school's representative at the forthcoming Clinical Congress of the American College of Surgeons, Dr. Paul R. Hawley, Director of the College, announced today. Representatives from thirty-six medical colleges will attend this year's Congress to be held in Atlantic City, September 28 - October 2, at College expense. Dr. Hawley explained. The student participation program was initiated as an educational contribution of the College, by action of the Board of Regents, four years ago. The medical colleges sending representatives to the Congress are rotated each year. It was explained. Students are selected by their classmates. Mr. Chandler, whose home address is 121 Lizard Avenue, Montreal, Que., will graduate from Dalhousie University Faculty of Medicine, Halifax, in 1960. He attended Prince of Wales College, Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, where he was a member of the student council. He completed his undergraduate work at Mount Allison University, Sackville, New Brunswick, receiving a B.S. degree. While at Mount Allison University, he was president of the Athletic Committee for two years, a member of the Men's Council, Students' Council and varsity football and hockey teams for four years. Mr. Chandler is now president of the Dalhousie Amateur Athletic Committee, financial chairman of Phi Rho Sigma medical fraternity, and active in varsity football and inter-faculty hockey.

He is son of H. Brimwell Chandler of the National Film Board of Canada. Student representatives at the Clinical Congress, world's largest meeting of surgeons, will attend a number of special sessions in addition to regularly scheduled lectures, discussions, motion picture demonstrations and television clinics covering all phases of surgical practice and research. MY FAMILY LOVES THIS RASPBERRY Double-boiler Pudding!

Grease upper part of double boiler generously. Measure into pan:
1 1/4 c. (10 oz. can) canned raspberries and syrup
1/4 c. granulated sugar
2 tps. corn starch
Mix well and set aside.

Sift together:
1/4 c. once-sifted pastry flour
or 1/4 c. once-sifted all-purpose flour
1 1/2 tps. Magic Baking Powder
1/4 tsp. salt
Cream
3 tps. shortening
Blend in
1/2 c. granulated sugar
1 egg
Combine
1/2 c. milk
1/4 tsp. vanilla
1/2 tsp. grated lemon rind

Turn hot pudding out onto a deep serving dish. Pass chilled custard sauce or pouring cream. Yield: 4 or 5 servings.
