A Curious Case.

The Hon. J. G. Blaine has furnished to the press a "personal statement" of facts referring to the marriage and divorce of his son, J. G. Blaine, junior.

This is a summary of Mr. Blaine's lengthy communication to the press. It must strike the intelligent by-stander that a society in which such young ladies are brought up and educated and can do such things is a little peculiar and not yet just right.

A Difficult Surgical Operation.

The Independent, published in Auburn, New York, contains the following allusion to a gentleman well known in Charlestown and Belfast:

"We referred briefly last week to an operation by Dr. O. O. Baker, of this city, upon Dr. Angus McSwain, of California, for movable kidney. We learn that this is a very difficult operation, and its success in this case speaks well for the skill of Dr. Baker. The kidney of Dr. McSwain became loosened eleven years ago and was caused by seasickness for forty days while sailing from California around Cape Horn. Sometimes it would be up against the liver, then down as far as the groin, and gave him great pain. He consulted such authorities as Agnew, of Philadelphia, Osler, of Baltimore, Gay, of Boston, Senn, of Chicago, and Tait, of England. Dr. Tait performed an operation, making an opening through the abdomen, and as Dr. McSwain was then lying on his back, he found the kidney in the right place, apparently firm, and concluded that his diagnosis was wrong, and did not attempt to fasten it. This was four years ago. The doctor came here this winter and Dr. Baker undertook the operation. He made the opening from the back and reached the kidney, cut off a portion of the capsule, or covering, making a wound, scarified the flesh at the place from which the kidney had been torn and united the two raw surfaces, and fastened it there by sutures. Since the operation the patient's temperature and pulse have been in excellent condition, and he moves about in bed more freely than he has done for years. There is every indication that the kidney is thoroughly fastened in place, and after three or four weeks' confinement, Dr. McSwain will be as well as ever. Dr. McSwain is a prominent physician of Santa Clara, and his coming to Auburn to have the operation performed showed great confidence in our surgeons. Of the 142 operations of this character recorded since 1858 68 per cent. were cured, 27 per cent. benefited and the other 5 per cent. probably were put out of their misery."

Yesterday afternoon the room of Edward G. Drew and wife, in their lodging house, was broken into. Mrs. Drew was found dead in bed, shot through the forehead. Her husband lay beside her with a bullet hole in his head. Drew was conscious. He professed lack of knowledge as to how his wife was shot, and told conflicting stories. Drew was twenty-five years old, his wife seventeen. It is reported that Drew had been jealous of his wife.

A Surplus Rolling Up.

Regulations for Pilotage.

The surplus for February was \$10,659.26. The surplus for the first eight months of the fiscal year is \$1,914,063. Hon Mr. Tupper has introduced a bill to amend the Pilotage Act and temporarily exempting vessels under 120 tons from compulsory pilotage.

Canada and Newfoundland.

Policy of the Government.

It is understood that the Government's attitude towards Newfoundland remains unchanged. While desirous of fair trade relations and anxious for the restoration of the entente cordiale, the policy adopted at the end of last year will not be departed from until Newfoundland shows a disposition to redeem her pledges and acts in a neighborly spirit.

BOODLERS TO BE PUNISHED.

"Confound their Knavish Tricks."

QUEBEC, March 7. Attorney General Cegrain has instituted an action to recover \$100,000 from Posaud the sum in question representing the Baies des Chaleurs steal. It is likewise an open secret that as soon as the elections are over, Merrier, Picaud and Langier will be arrested charged with conspiring to defraud the Province out of \$60,000 in connection with Langier's stationery transactions.

Fatal Accident at Sea.

GLoucester, Mass., March 7. The schooner Lizzie Griffin, from Grand Banks, reports the loss of two of her crew by the capizing of the dory, viz., Joseph Grady, St. Francis Harbor, and Daniel McAskill, Cape Breton.

Proposal Rejected.

OTTAWA, March 7. It is rumored that the United States Government has rejected Lord Salisbury's proposal for the application of a close season to the prescribed area of the Behring Sea, pending the settlement by the arbitrators.

Instantly Killed.

Boston, March 7. James Doogue, foreman of the laborers at work on the Common, Saturday morning slipped and fell under the wheels of a cart which passed over his neck, killing him instantly.

Quebec Elections.

MONTEAL, March 7. Although there is great excitement throughout the Province over Tuesday's elections, most of the old campaigners predict a decisive victory for DeBoucherville.

NEW YORK, March 7. The jury couldn't agree as to E. M. Field's sanity. Eight were in his favor and four against.

A Kingston, Ont., despatch says that Father Donvers has left on route to Brazil to arrange for the transfer of 265 Polish families, now resident in Renfrew county, to that country. They are promised land, and paid passages from New York.

Advices from Lagos, a British colony on the east coast of Africa, are of a warlike character. Egba, with 200,000 warriors, has joined the Jebus to stop British traffic. The British force in Lagos is weak and must be reinforced before offensive operations can be undertaken.

Notwithstanding the attempt of the newspapers to belittle the Sayward decision, it has caused profound disappointment in British official circles. The general opinion is it greatly strengthens the position of the United States before the world.

Redemption of the Evening.

"Man poeth forth unto his work, and to his labor until the evening."—Psalms 104:23. From the above text Rev. W. W. Brewer preached the first of a monthly series of sermons to young men last evening.
