

Harbor Improvement.

PUBLIC MEETING AT CAVENTISH.

A meeting of the inhabitants of Cavendish, Bay View and vicinities was held in Cavendish Hall on Monday evening the 11th inst.

The meeting was called for the purpose of discussing harbor improvements and was organized by appointing C. F. Simpson to the chair and the undersigned secretary.

Arthur Simpson was first to address the meeting. He spoke of the very bad condition of our harbor at present; of the difficulties we have in getting our produce shipped off, and the failure of our trade generally.

Whereas, The inhabitants of this and adjoining districts are subject to great inconveniences for want of access to markets for our surplus produce—we having no railway accommodation—and by the filling up of the bar, our harbor has become almost useless.

And Whereas, The breakwater constructed some years since caused a decided improvement in our harbor for a number of years, and we believe it would be a much greater benefit had it been extended farther to sea;

Resolved, That it is the opinion of this meeting that the Federal Government should at once send a competent engineer to examine the harbor and report to the Department of Public Works, and that the work of extending the breakwater should be proceeded with as soon as possible.

The resolution was seconded by W. D. Clark. W. J. Simpson, in supporting the resolution, said that it represented his views on the matter.

John Hogan, of Hope River, was in favor of the resolution. He thought we should make a strong united effort to get our harbor improved.

Captain John Stewart gave his experience of the harbor. He said that the channel had become too wide and full of lumps. He wanted the breakwater extended to confine the channel.

Dr. McNeill, of Stanley, on being called on, said he was in sympathy with the resolution. He said we wanted a good harbor, and thought a railway was also much needed in order that we might be able to ship our produce in the spring before the ice left the North Side.

After further remarks by G. W. Simpson, W. H. Hogan, G. R. McNeill, D. M. Simpson and others, who strongly advocated harbor improvement and argued that we were entitled to a grant from the Dominion Government to repair and extend our breakwater, the resolution was put to the meeting and carried unanimously.

G. W. Simpson then moved the following: Resolved, That, as no work can be constructed in time to benefit our harbor for our next season's trade, the Dominion Government be requested to send the dredge, next spring, to clear out the channel, and also to dredge the channel in the vicinity of Bay View wharf, as we are of the opinion that a small outlay in this respect would very much improve our facilities for shipping.

In support of this resolution Mr. Simpson said that, in his opinion, the dredge would do good work in cleaning out the channel through the bar, and also in deepening the water at Bay View wharf, which at present does not accommodate schooners of a large size.

This resolution was seconded by Patrick Reid, who was satisfied that it was a move in the right direction, and from which he expected the very best results.

The resolution was also spoken to by D. M. Simpson, A. Simpson, John Reid, Angus McKenzie and the Secretary, after which it was put and carried unanimously.

It was then ordered that the Chairman and Secretary send copies of the resolutions adopted at the meeting to the Department of Public Works, to our representatives at Ottawa, and to other parties who they might consider would exert an influence towards the granting of our requests. It was also ordered that a report of the meeting be published in the Charlottetown papers.

After a vote of thanks to the Chairman, the meeting adjourned. WALTER SIMPSON, Secretary. Feb. 12th, 1889. (Patriot and Herald please copy.)
