## Accused Fined \$200 For Sale Of Liquor

SUMMERSIDE — Emanuel S. Gallant, Summerside, was fined \$200 and costs or three months in jail when he appeared before Magistrate W. Chester S. Macdonald in County Court Thursday morning on a charge of unlawfully selling liquor. The accused was represented by Neil R. MacLeod.

Sterling Gaiway, Summerside, pleaded guilty to a charge of driving while impaired. He was fined \$75 and costs or 15 days.

Leonard Joseph Arsenault, Middletown, charged with driving while his license was suspended had the charge against him dismissed for lack of sufficient evidence.

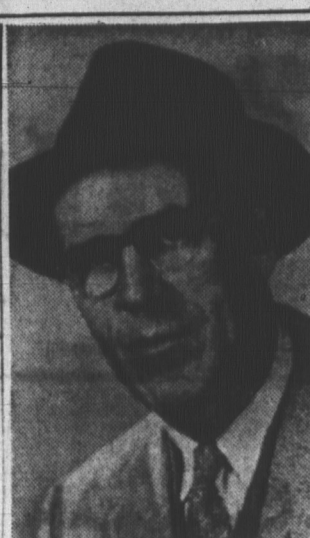
A resident of Seven Mile Bay, John Douglas Wood, charged with causing a disturbance in a public place was fined \$25 and costs or 15 days.

# Army Coup In Ghana Seen Blow To China

LONDON (AP)—The coup in Ghana was widely regarded here Thursday night as a source of embarrassment for the Chinese Communists in Africa, where their diplomacy already is in trouble.

President Kwame Nkrumah arrived in Peking just as the world learned rebels had toppled his regime in Ghana.

The Chinese Communists seemed to have suffered a loss of face. They were in the position of playing hosts to a man whose whole power base was cut from under him.

Army coups in other African countries—particularly those in the former French colonies—have in recent months forced out civilian regimes that had begun moving toward Peking. In addition, Kenya and other African countries have been angered by what they call Chinese meddling in their affairs.

The Chinese pitched their drive in Africa on the theme they were members of a colored race and were better partners for the black Africans than the Russians.

British officials were silent on the significance of the Ghana coup. One official took note of Nkrumah's arrival in Peking and said in jest:

"I suppose that the redeemer now will set up a government-in-exile in Peking."

Nkrumah had taken the title *osagyefo* or redeemer.

By contrast with Nkrumah's friendship with Moscow and Peking, he has quarrelled with his African neighbors and Western countries for most of Ghana's life as an independent country. Diplomatically, his extreme positions often have left him isolated.

Togo in particular has accused Nkrumah of trying to take it over. The Togolese government harbored a number of political exiles from Ghana.

Ghana was one of only two Commonwealth countries to respond to the call of the Organization of African Unity to break relations with Britain because the British government refused to use force to overthrow the breakaway regime in Rhodesia. The other was Tanzania.

The break between Ghana and London took place Dec. 16. Britain is represented in Accra by Australia. Ghana chose a non-Commonwealth country, Lebanon, to represent its interests in London.

Britain has given shelter to K. A. Busia, the exiled Ghana Opposition leader, who has continued to pursue his campaign against Nkrumah from London.

Last year the British government asked for clemency for two former Ghanaian ministers sentenced to death for conspiracy to commit treason.

The Ghana government—although it eventually commuted the executions—said Busia and other Ghanaian exiles were associates of the convicted men.

Throughout the diplomatic difficulties, Britain has poured aid into Ghana, with the largest single injection a \$25,000,000 (\$15,000,000) loan for construction of the Volta Dam. But \$23,000,000 (\$9,900,000) of this money has not been drawn.

test of the social assistance program.

Also forecast is a policy of sharing in the cost of premiums in a program of assistance to farmers and farm laborers to compensate for injuries received on the farm.

In the field of health, public health nursing services are to be expanded to provide a follow up service for patients released from mental hospitals. Financial assistance will be given to students taking dentistry training.

Two new appointments are forecast. The government plans to hire an economist to investigate and advise on the various policies and forms of financial assistance available through federal government departments.

Also forecast is the appointment of a director of guidance and special education to assist "our youth to progress from primary and secondary school and to adjust to the demands of our present society."

### WCTU Meets At Zion Church

The Charlottetown Women's Christian Temperance Union met on Monday afternoon in the Zion Church lady's parlor. The worship service was led by Mrs. Julia MacInnis. The programme of the meeting was based on the life and works of the founder of the society, Francis Willard. The programme for youth temperance week was discussed and the plans were decided upon. The meeting closed with prayer.

**ROADS, INDUSTRY**

The government promises to expand its program of upgrading and paving secondary roads.

In the field of industry, legislation is promised to provide for the establishment and operation of industrial parks.

The speaker notes that "as a result of negotiations, an electric power link will connect the Prince Edward Island with the mainland power grid. Our province will become a full partner in the Maritime Provinces Electric Power Pool.

Continued development and expansion of provincial parks is promised. The government plans to lend support to all programs providing for larger and better accommodation for tourists.

It is noted that the government's announced intention to provide a new salary scale for teachers will "result in greater retention and recruitment of teachers for the profession."

### AGRICULTURE, FISHERIES

For agriculture, amendments to broaden the coverage under the Crop Insurance Act and the Farm Establishment Act will be presented at the session.

It is forecast that under a revised ARDA agreement, a comprehensive program will be applied that will promote improved farm operations, render assistance in the reclamation and improvement of farm lands and expand the reforestation and water conservation programs.

The government plans to begin a plan to assist in the marketing of "high quality butter and cheese."

Several items for the promotion of the fisheries industry were mentioned. Promised was the completion in 1966 of the policy of providing paved roads to fishing centres. The government also promised to provide financial support for fishermen of District Eight who suffered losses last season.

Fisheries is included in the forecast of "a comprehensive training project in the total manpower development program which will also include agriculture, tourist promotion and handicrafts."

The government program to provide homes for special care is forecast to be expanded

### Canadian Breweries Sales Down

TORONTO (CP) — Canadian Breweries Ltd. today reported unsatisfactory sales and profits for the year ended Oct. 31.

Announcing this in an annual statement, President J. G. Campbell said net earnings fell 31.7 per cent to \$11,320,000 or 41 cents a share from \$16,571,857 or 65 cents the previous year.

Sales declined 2.8 per cent to \$400,931,310 from \$412,305,808.

Sales and profits from Canadian operations were up slightly, but sales dropped 8.4 per cent in the United States and the American subsidiary operated at a loss, the statement said.

The statement said the company's financial position remains strong. Working capital at the year end was \$53,656,197 compared with \$70,043,966 a year earlier.

The company also said it will change the date of its fiscal year. The next report will cover the six months ending April 30, with the next full fiscal year ending April 30, 1967.

### Phone President Is Re-Elected

TORONTO (CP) — Marcel Vincent, president of Bell Telephone Co. of Canada Ltd., was re-elected president of the Canadian Council of the International Chamber of Commerce Thursday.

Vice-presidents elected at the council's 20th annual meeting included Victor deB Oland of Halifax.

The executive committee includes Georges L. Demers, Quebec.

Among the directors is Ewart A. Pratt of St. John's, Nfld.

### Tire Prices Increased

AKRON, Ohio (AP)—A price increase of from one to three per cent on passenger, truck and farm tires has been announced by the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Co., effective April 1.

Goodyear said the price increases still leave passenger tire prices below 1957 levels.

As an example, the tire firm cited the price of its 7.75-15 power cushion passenger tire, the most popular size in a tire used as original equipment. The tire now lists at \$30.10 and will go to \$31 April 1. The 1957 price for the comparable tire was \$33.10, said Charles A. Eaves Jr., vice-president of replacement tire sales.
