THE MAILS—The tug Wm. Aitken arrived last night about 9 o'clock from Cape Tormentine with 38 bags of mail and several passengers, including Messrs. George Boyd, of Montreal, and P. J. Quinn, of St. John, commercial travellers. She left again this morning with mails and Mr. Spence as a passenger. She is expected to return this evening, bringing the mails.

TEACHERS' INSTITUTE—The annual meeting of the Prince County Teachers' Institute will be held on Thursday and Friday, the 28th and 29th of June. The following have consented to read papers: D. THE MARKET—The attendance at the market to-day was small. The farmers report the roads in a very bad condition. Eggs sold at 12c per doz; butter (fresh) at from 22 to 24c per lb; cheese from 65 to 70c. Very little hay, oats and pork was for sale, and no potatoes. Hay is quoted at from 70 to 80c per ewt; oats at from 26 to 27c per bushel, and pork at from 2 1/2 to 3c per lb.

WORK RESUMED—Satisfactory arrangements between the Charlottetown Steam Navigation Company and the Dominion Government have been effected, and to-day the steamer Northumberland left for Point du Chene, arriving there at 12.15 p. m. She leaves to-morrow at noon for Charlottetown. The captain reports a great quantity of ice in the straits.

THE STANLEY—The Stanley, which left Pictou at 6 this morning, arrived at Georgetown at noon with ten carloads of freight and seventy passengers, with 150 packages of baggage. The cargo consists chiefly of English goods, hay, etc. There were ten lady passengers and twenty commercial men, including Wm. H. Wright, Tompkins and Preston, Mr. Ewen McDougall, of this city, and the crew of the "wrecked schooner Laurier." Captain Fin-ayson reports a great quantity of ice in the Straits, and he had great difficulty in getting through. She leaves on return to Pictou to-morrow morning, and will try and make a return trip. A special train will bring the passengers from Georgetown which is expected to arrive in the city about 4 o'clock this afternoon.

HURRAH FOR OLD MCGILL!—"Both inside and outside the Opera House to-night, Ottawa has been ringing with the cry, "What's the matter with old McGill?" And everywhere the answer has been "She's all right, you bet!" The Glee and Banjo clubs of the old university have fairly captivated the town and sent the immense audience that packed the Opera House crazy with laughter and pleasure. The banjo solo of Mr. John H. Parker made the hit of the evening; but "Schneider's Band," by the Glee Club, ran it a very close second. The vice-regal boxes were occupied by Lord and Lady Aberdeen and suite, and their Excellencies seemed to be thoroughly enjoying the performance, frequently applauding most heartily.
