Complete Alberton Credit Union To Montrose Power Line
-The Maritime Electric Co. Ltd. have completed the extension of new power lines from Alberton to Montrose and within the next several days the job of tying the lines to the poles and hooking up present power users along the route from the old to the new lines will be completed. New lines have also been rebuilt to nearly all sections of the town of Alberton and when completed it is expected that the work of extending the power transmission lines from Montrose to Tignish will be started. It is estimated that there are now over 90 homes and places of business in Tignish wired and ready to be hooked up. In spite of cold, wet weather which was partially blamed for a recent serious accident, the work has gone ahead on schedule with no lost days by the regular line crew and a number of local men from the town. Power interruptions have been frequent the past two days but this situation will be cleared up when all necessary circuits have been hooked up.

Lord Kenilworth, who was John Davenport Siddeley until he was created a baron in 1937, was a pioneer in the British auto business.
His first car, known as the Autocar, was built in 1904.

Canada May Send Note To U.S. On Air Service
OTTAWA, (CP) - The Canadian government will make new, and probably stronger, diplomatic representations to the United States to get clearance for an air service between Canada and Mexico by way of Tampa, Fla.
Transport Minister Chevrier said Tuesday the external affairs department, which has had informal discussions with the U. S. state department on the issue in the last few months, will act again in an attempt to obtain removal of a U.S. block to the proposed service.
Another informant said diplomatic moves would re-open almost immediately and might start with a formal note setting out this government's objections to U. S. policy that has held up the projected Oct. 31 opening of a Montreal-Toronto-Tampa-Mexico City run.
The service has been blocked by insistence of the U. S. Civil Aeronautics Board that Trans-Canada Air Lines use different planes on the Toronto-Tampa and Tampa-Mexico City legs.

May Be Big Uranium Find In Algoma Area
BLIND RIVER, Ont., (CP) - Mines Minister Kelly of Ontario said there is "a strong possibility" the Algoma area might soon become the scene of a third great Canadian uranium discovery.
Mr. Kelly was speaking at Uranium Day celebrations in this town midway between Sudbury and Sault Ste. Marie. The day was aimed at drawing attention to development work on uranium mining claims in the district, marking a new phase in its economic development.
Mr. Kelly said deposits of uranium in this area are not only widespread, but in some cases show signs of ore grade.
"Government geologists are extremely conservative men," he said, "but figures of the mines department bear out the claim that it is a real staking rush, one of the greatest in Ontario's mining history.
He said 5,500 claims had been filed for the Blind River area in nearby Sault Ste. Marie. All but a few of these were for uranium. In addition, 3,207 more were filed at Sudbury.
