TUPPER CLUB MEETING.

Rousing Speeches and a Large Attendance.

There was a crowded house at the meeting of the Tupper Club last night, and the greatest enthusiasm prevailed. Mr. J. B. Dawson, president of the club, occupied the chair.

The first speaker was Mr. Robert E. Smith who reviewed the political situation, pointing out the many short-comings of the Laurier Tarte Administration and showing why they were not deserving of a renewal of power. His remarks were followed with the closest attention and were warmly applauded at the close.

Mr. Donald McKinnon, another of the bright young men of the Tupper Club, spoke next. He contrasted Canada with other countries, showing her great resources and possibilities and pointing out what had been done in the way of development by the Liberal Conservative party. He also showed how the Liberals had violated the promises they made to the people and demonstrated clearly that they were not the party to return to power. Mr. McKinnon made an excellent impression.

Mr. Maurice Blake, who spoke after Mr. McKinnon, gave the members of the Club some excellent advice. He reviewed former contests, and provoked great enthusiasm as he predicted the overwhelming defeat of the New Liberals on the 7th November.

Mr. W. J. O'Reilly, a life-long Liberal, next addressed the meeting, pointing out that many of the acts of the present administration were not such as ought to meet the approval of an honest electorate. He censured the government for using public money on the eve of an election for the avowed purpose of influencing voters; for doing work at the eleventh hour that should have been done before. He also spoke of the failure of the Liberals to carry out their pre-election promises regarding reciprocal trade. Mr. O'Reilly was well received, and his remarks were heartily applauded.

Mr. E. F. Carbonell, another old-time Liberal, also spoke, showing the utter incapacity of the present administration. He showed how they had added to the burden of taxation in the face of their promise to lessen it; how they had added to the burden of the poor man instead of reducing them; how, in short, they had done the things they should not have done, and left undone that which they should have done. Mr. Carbonell spoke well and added to the good impression he made at previous meetings of the Club.

Between the speeches the Messrs. Payne gave several instrumental selections, which were greatly enjoyed, and Mr. J. J. McGowan gave a reading that captured the house.
