

Industrial Expansion Said Strictly Job Of Selling City

The president of the Canadian Federation of Mayors and Municipalities and Mayor of Arnprior, Ontario, Robert M. Simpson, speaking of the strides made in his hometown in industrialization said, "If you are going to do any real industrial promotion you have to realize first that it is purely a selling job."

Paying a courtesy call on Mayor Edwin C. Johnston, yesterday morning, he was greeted as an old friend by the Mayor and Councillors A. Walthen Gaudet and Gerald R. Foster.

He told of the industrial promotion done in Arnprior where he personally did the 'selling' job of interesting industry in establishing plants in his town. He was successful to the extent that 12 new industries were established in the past six years.

Mayor Simpson said that now there are 1,300 industrial jobs in the town whose population is only 5,400 with workers coming in from many outside points.

AWAKENING NEEDED In stating that the whole country needs to wake up to the need for promotion of industrial development to prevent losing export markets he expressed thorough approval of the establishment by the Atlantic Provinces of their own agent in London, England.

He believes Watson Jamer is doing an excellent job and terms his efforts to promote a tour of the Atlantic Provinces by European businessmen a 'forward step' in bringing the attractions of the region to the people interested in possible development of it. He termed this 'positive action.'

Church Corner Stone Laid One Hundred Years Ago

TIGNISH — One hundred years ago this summer the corner stone of the St. Simon and St. Jude Catholic Church at Tignish was blessed and laid in place by the Right Rev. Colin MacKinnon, Bishop of Archa.

Present for the occasion were Rev. Father Martel his secretary, the pastor Rev. Peter McIntyre, who later became Bishop of Charlottetown. Rev. Father James MacDonald of Indian River, Rev. Father MacPhee of St. Andrews, Rev. Father MacDonald of East Point and others. Due to the serious illness of Bishop MacDonald of Charlottetown, at the time, he was unable to attend and perform the ceremonies much to the regret of all those present.

CORNER STONE The corner stone itself had been hewed from a large granite boulder which was transported from a field near Killdare Capes on the outskirts of Tignish.

Following the blessing ceremonies, His Lordship Bishop MacKinnon celebrated Pontifical High Mass, assisted by Rev. Dr. MacDonald as deacon and Rev. Father Martel as sub-deacon. The ceremonies were in charge of Rev. Father Aubrey from Montreal who had been an assistant of the pastor, Rev. Peter McIntyre, since the work had started on the new church.

Among the diocesan and visiting clergy was the aged and beloved Rev. Father Sylvan Perry from Mesouche who had served the good people of Tignish for many years prior to the time he was succeeded by the Rev. Peter McIntyre in 1943.

Then on the 18th day of August, 1860, the long awaited for opening service and dedication ceremonies were performed by Most Reverend Dr. Connolly, Archbishop of Halifax, assisted by the Bishops of Chatham, Archa, Charlottetown and St. John, together with a large number of visiting prelates, clergy and notables from the Maritime Provinces.

Next year (1960) will mark the 100th anniversary of the opening of worship in 1860, and already plans are under way by the present pastor, Rev. M. J. Rooney, to hold and appropriate centennial celebrations to commemorate the memorable event of one hundred years ago.

It is constructed of domestic brick throughout in Gothic design. The spire which stands 185 feet high from the ground, not only serve as an emblem of the Christian faith but as a beacon or landmark for fishermen far out at sea.

Seven months after the blessing of the corner stone, Bishop MacDonald of Charlottetown died on December 30, 1959. On May 6, 1960, Rev. Peter McIntyre of Tignish, under whose pastoral charge the new church there had been erected, was appointed Bishop of Charlottetown, in succession, to be named as the Sec of Prince Edward Island.

In that year the church at Tignish nearing completion, it was decided by the newly elected Bishop of Charlottetown, Father Peter McIntyre, that the time had come to hold the first solemn opening service with a dedication ceremony.

Next, he found he was out of cigarettes. He reached into the back seat, where he kept a carton. The cigarettes were gone too.

Schwartz reported the theft to police. "I lost some money in a bank once years ago," he explained.

STARTED MONDAY

Violence under Red agitation began earlier in the week. Monday the rioters were suppressed by tear-gas charges followed by club-wielding police.

New mobs formed overnight and brought a fresh reign of terror in the city of more than 2,000,000 capital of West Bengal—once aptly called by Kipling 'The City of Dreadful Night' and now a hotbed of Indian communism.

Many students were among the rioters and clashes developed between them and the vastly outnumbered police.

Rioters seized control of several areas by night and attacked police wagons and government cars with bombs and torches.

The government clamped on a strict order prohibiting assembly of more than five persons.

HELD DOWNTOWN AREA

At one time the rioters controlled most of downtown Calcutta including the area around Government House.

The rioting there is on a much greater scale than the recent disturbances in Kerala state, where Prime Minister Nehru finally stepped in to dislodge the Communist state government by legal procedures and suppressed the violence. Also, the roles of government and communism are reversed here.

There was no immediate indication that the central government might step into the troubles in Calcutta.
