Civil Jury Cases In Supreme Court

Three civil jury cases at the Supreme Court at Georgetown yesterday were disposed of when the plaintiff and defendant in each reached an agreement. Another case was set over until the July sitting and a fifth called before the court adjourned until Nov. 19. Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell presided.

The first case called was that of Violet Reynolds, vs. William Miller, an action for damages arising out of an accident at Murray River in which a child was killed. Action was brought by his mother, a widow.

Mr. S. S. Hessian, K.C. represented the plaintiff and Mr. G. Foster and Mr. R. R. Bell, K.C. the defendant. Counsel for the parties told the court they had reached an agreement in favor of the plaintiff for \$600. The court concurred, ruling that the costs would be paid by the defendant.

In the afternoon the civil jury case of Peter J. Solomon, administrator plaintiff vs. George J. Tweedy, defendant was called. Mr. M. Alban Farmer, K.C. represented the plaintiff and Mr. H. F. McPhee, K.C. the defendant.

This was an action for damages amounting to \$20,000 arising out of an accident at Southport last spring, in which a man was killed. Counsel told the court an agreement had been reached and the formal judgment being that the defendant pay \$5,000 to the plaintiff, and each party pay his own costs.

Another damages case arising out of the same accident followed, Charles A. Gardiner, plaintiff, vs. George J. Tweedy, defendant, an action for \$5,000 damages. In this case damages were being sought following injuries to a man.

The same counsel as in the previous case announced that an agreement had been reached. The court's judgment was that the defendant pay the plaintiff \$2,000, each party to pay his own costs.

The next case was another civil jury case, the Haselton Granite Quarrie, Bebbe, Quebec, plaintiff, vs. Vere Beck and Son Ltd., defendant, an action for damages for breach of contract. Mr. D. L. Mathieson, K.C. represented the plaintiff and Mr. F. A. Large, K.C. the defendant. This is an action for damages arising out of a fatality on a railway crossing near Carignan last fall.

The case was adjourned until next Monday without any progress being made. The only action was to pick 28 petty jurymen who were told to attend on Monday.
