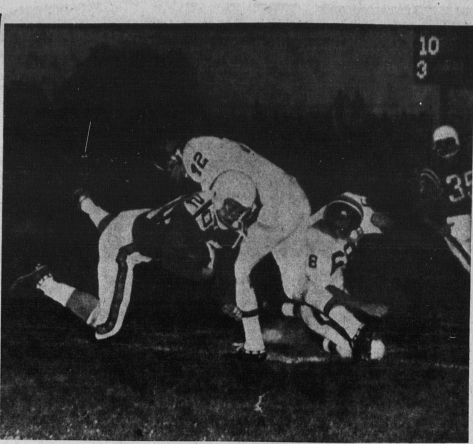

MONTREAL (CP) - Charlie Sifford, one of the few negroes ever to trudge the golf tournament, laced out a five-under-par 67 Friday and a two-round total of 138 and a one-shot lead at the halfway mark of the Canadian open golf championship.

Sifford, 29, now playing out of Los Angeles, was flawless with his mastery of the still soggy Laval-sur-le-Lac course. He finished early and the low scores of Thursday, including George Knudson of Toronto took a first-round 67 himself, tried futilely to catch up. Sifford's 138 stood up for six hours without being beaten.
