

# Labor Minister Criticized For Views Given To Union

OTTAWA (CP)—Labor Minister Nicholson was criticized by union leaders here after he told a conference on manpower training that voluntary co-operation between labor and management can solve some of the problems in this field.

The four-day conference, due to end at a closed-door session today, is working on a manpower policy statement for the Canadian Labor Congress convention in Winnipeg April 25-29.

# Pearson Outlines Benefits From New Manpower Dept.

OTTAWA (CP)—The proposed manpower department will encourage immigration and teach new skills to those who have been left behind by the affluent society, Prime Minister Pearson said here.

Another of its aims will be to assist employers and unions to work together in providing workers displaced by automation, he told a conference on manpower sponsored by the Canadian Labor Congress.

The department to be headed by Immigration Minister Marchand once Parliament has passed the necessary legislation, would combine humanitarian and economic objectives.

"It remains as true as ever," Mr. Pearson said, "that this country has everything to gain from further increases in our population—larger markets and lower costs of production, improvements in our standard of living and wider ability to afford them."

The area of most urgent need is job training for unemployed adults.

Adults attending vocational schools would get higher allowances and no longer would be disqualified from unemployment insurance benefits.

He said the Canadian economy is more prosperous than ever, but management-labor cooperation was needed to help workers adjust to dislocations flowing from technological change.

He said warnings that automation will cause mass unemployment or reduce work weeks greatly are unfounded. The problem was one of retraining and adaptation.

The new department would need about two years to develop an ample, qualified and understanding staff to deal with the public in communities across the country.

## Cattle Imports May Be Halted

OTTAWA (CP)—An outbreak of foot-and-mouth disease in Europe may force a halt to Canadian imports of Charolais cattle from France, an agriculture department official said here.

R. J. McClenaghan, director of contagious diseases, said France so far has not been hit by the outbreak, which he termed the worst in a decade. The danger is that it will spread to France.

"If similar outbreaks occur in France, possibility of further importation will be fairly remote," Mr. McClenaghan said in an interview.

France has stringent control measures against foot-and-mouth disease and this was one reason why the federal government began allowing Charolais into Canada last year. Canada in turn, is trying to develop a market for Holsteins in France.

A herd of 110 Charolais from France were brought to Canada last October before the European outbreak under stringent regulations to see that none carried foot-and-mouth disease.

They are still in quarantine in order to ensure they are not carriers. No sign of it has appeared and the agriculture department hopes to release them to Canadian buyers in the spring. They are breeding cattle.

Mr. McClenaghan said Canada is watching the French situation closely.

"We want to see what develops in the next few months."

The outbreaks have occurred in Switzerland, Belgium, West Germany, Italy and other countries, he said.

"You can have waves of the disease just like flu in humans," Mr. McClenaghan said.

## Britain Waits Decision On Gas Turbine

LONDON (CP)—Britain is anxiously awaiting Canada's decision on the kind of gas turbine engines that will be used in the Royal Canadian Navy's new class of high-speed frigates.

A British official has disclosed that a gas turbine to be fitted into new guided-missile destroyers to be ordered for the Royal Navy later this year is also being studied by the Canadians for possible use in the new Canadian ships.

Confirming this, a Canadian official said it is a toss-up whether the turbine to be finally chosen will come from Britain or the United States. Canada plans to order about four or five of the new class of Canadian frigates and the contracts for the gas turbines will be substantial.

The two competing power units under consideration by Canada are derived from the Bristol Siddeley Olympus and the Pratt and Whitney J-75 aircraft turbines. The Olympus marine version, which has been tested in West Germany for 300 hours, will go into the new British destroyers to provide sudden bursts of high speed. The aircraft version may be fitted into the Anglo-French Concorde supersonic commercial aircraft new under development.

The Canadian official said evaluation of the British and American turbine systems may take about a year before a final decision is reached.

It is difficult to invent a new play in bridge, but this hand features a play which comes close to hitting the mark. It arose in a pair tournament many years ago.

None of the South players succeeded in making three no-trump, but later analysis revealed that the contract should have been made.

The play went more or less the same at all tables. West led a heart, dummy played low, and South took the jack with the queen. After cashing four club tricks, declarer led either a diamond or a spade. West taking the ace and retaining a heart, declarer could have cashed
