MATHIESON DEFEATED BY WRIGHT

Climaxing a series of favorite upsets that saw F. MacMillan, G. F. Hutcheson, S. Macklin and Don Gass suffer elimination Art Wright yesterday secured a berth in the finals of the Charlottetown Tennis Club's men's singles when he defeated rangy Alex Mathieson in four sets after losing the opening set of the match. The scores were 5-7, 6-2, 6-4.

Although Iriam's victory over the heavily favored Don Gass was probably the biggest upset of the tournament Mathieson's elimination yesterday was unexpected. The tall lawyer was somewhat handicapped by a sore ankle but Wright, a steady playing youth played sure, winning tennis all the way.

The other semi-final match was halted by darkness with Fulton Pierce and George Iriam having won two sets apiece and deadlocked at 5 games each in the deciding set. The players were waging a see-saw battle up to the time of postponement with Pierce winning the first and third sets and Iriam capturing the second and fourth. A loss-up from the start, odds are still even on the outcome of the match which will be decided today upon completion of the final set. The winner will meet Art Wright for the Club's singles title immediately afterwards.

The match between the two young players was the semi-final feature and one of the finest battles of the entire tournament. Both Pierce and Iriam have just recently blossomed into promising racket wielders.

In the ladies' division, with the semi-finals completed yesterday, the finals were set over until tomorrow. Lady finalists are E. Sinclair and M. Morris.

let of her—and to some extent, horses in front of her, hers not to reason why. Anyhow, it is a really wonderful affair and those who go to Montague on Wednesday will see it tried out. If it is a success you may expect to see Tyndall operating on the Grand Circuit, unless the fact of his not having time to patent it may make it available for other trainers' adoption without recourse to the originator.

By the way, Plucky Scott sports a tab of 2.06 as a two-year-old, and as a matter of fact was one of the best two-year-olds in the world four years ago. She raced well as a three year old and was second in 2.10 1-2 at that age. As a four-year-old she was off and last year she was also off, the only start being at Charlottetown where her manners were not good and she caught the banner. If Tyndall can straighten her out she has the 2.15 classes at her mercy, as she can go away like a rocket and a mile in 2.10 is play for her.

Soviet, with a new record of 2.12 1-4 taken at Alberton, is quite a drop from 2.19 1-2 in his winning race at Summerside. Not only that but the new record was after seventeen scores in which Soviet went around almost to the eighth pole every trip. He must be a tough one and there appears to be a very hopeful future for him.

Bob O'Boy, 2.14 is now in the stable of Tyndall Semple at Kensington, as is also Mac Volo 2.12 1-4. Plucky Scott 2.06 and two others.

Fred H. Phillips has written a series of articles which will appear from time to time in the Telegraph Journal. Saint John, entitled: "Canada's Pastest Half-Mile Track," in which he describes epic harness races given over the Fredericton oval and a notable series of records hung up there. In the second installment he describes how a string of American horses came to the Maritimes in 1877. One of them called Princess was a starter in the three minute class at Fredericton as were also Saco Boy and The Flying Dutchman, owned and driven by R. H. Edwards of Halifax, the only Maritime horse in the event.

The race was a contest between Princess and Lady Dismore. Princess took the first two heats in 2.36 and 2.32. The third was declared no heat. Lady Dismore won the fourth and fifth in 2.37 and 2.34. The sixth heat was a dead heat between the two leaders, then Princess went out and won the seventh and race in 2.30. The time was disputed on account of the track being a hundred yards short of a mile. It was claimed further that the American horses were "trippers" and the so-called Princess was later identified as Fannie Raymond.

At Kempville, Ontario, June 23rd, Worthy Widow won the 2.17 class after Dominion Grattan had copied the first heat in 2.11. Bedford Grattan won the Free-for-All, best time 2.11.

At Deloraine, Man., June 19th, Unique won the 2.22 Trot and Pace, best time 2.11. The 2.30 class was won by Carlonique, best time 2.13.

Calumet Evelyn, world's 4 year old pacing record of 1.59 1-2 and a time trotting record of 2.00 last fall, now sports an honest-to-goodness trotting record of 2.02 made in a winning race at Lexington recently.

The Canadian pacer Dominion Grattan 1.59 1-2, record taken at Lexington the latter part of June, repeated his winning stunt at Cleveland, Ohio, where he triumphed over a classy field in the Edwards Stake. His first heat was in two minutes.

One of the best three-year-old trotters of the year is Craftsman, son of Protector (3) 1.59 1-4, who won his race in straight heats at Cleveland, Ohio, taking a record the second trip of 2.04.

One of the great horsemen of the long ago passed away recently at Detroit, Michigan. When Axel 2:12 was sold by the telegraph operator, C. W. Williams, for \$105,000, Fred T. Moran, recently deceased, was one of the group that paid that tremendous price. He continued his interest in the harness horse almost up until the time of his death. Among the great trotters bred and raced by him was Lee Worthy (4) 2:02 1-4.

No fewer than 26 pacing stars are named in the \$2,500 Free-for-All Pace which will feature the race program of the Skowhegan, Maine, fair the week of August 17th-22nd. Three of the fastest wigglers named in this event have records of two minutes or better. They are Laurel Hanover 1:56 1-4, Zombro Hanover 2:00 and May E. Grattan 1:59 1-4.

Hopes, another notorious ringer was brought to Fredericton to attempt a mile in 2.25 or better, but failed in his attempt. After his appearance in Fredericton he was purchased by W. H. Vanderbit of New York who teamed him with Lady Mac and this pair in 1879 trotted a mile in 2.23.

Continuing the history of Fredericton track Mr. Phillips writes: "The Walla—Year Book of 1893 contains another epic of 'way back when.' On September 21st of that year Arclight, driven by C. W. Bell of Saint John, bettered the 2.25 mark. The event was a 2.28 Trot for a purse of \$300 and the winner took it in three straight heats, teamed at 2.27 1-2, 2.24 3-4 and 2.27 1-4. The other starters were Favorite, Stranger and Deceiver. The 2:24 3-4 mark set by Arclight continued to be sporting gossip for no little time, but later when LeRoy Willis, the sporting proprietor of the Dufferin Hotel in Saint John, drove Special B'end an exhibition mile over the Fredericton track for a record of 2:21 1-2, then men slapped their hams—that, they vowed, was the limit."

They were stepping fast at LaChute, Quebec, June 18th. Kedgwick, by Lee Tide (same sire as Soviet) won the 2.17 Trot, best time 2.09 3-4. Peter Schuyler won the 2.24 Pace, best time 2.10 1-2, while Bedford Grattan accounted for the 2.12 Mixed, best time 2.10 1-4.

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In the Free-for-All Trot at the same meeting Guy the Tramp is entered with a bunch of stars that

includes the great half-mile track trotter Lu Barient 2:03 1-4 and her stable mate Louis Guy 2:04 3-4. All the races at this great Maine fair are filled and fast time may be expected, as in addition to a classy bunch of horses the Skowhegan track is considered one of the glibbest half-mile ovals in America.

Last week we mentioned that we could not find any trace of the pacer White Sox that finished on Hanover Courier's neck at Saint John, Dominion Day, when he paced in 2:16, which equals the track C. M. Alexander, held by Border Prince 2:12 1-4. In Jimmie Power's column of the Halifax Herald Wednesday evening is the following: "White Sox, which forced Hanover Courier out in that time, was imported this spring. He came from the West, bought in a carload of horses. He is a pacing gelding and is of unknown breeding." The owner of White Sox will have some difficulty when he starts to enter his horse in purse races, as the National Trotting Association will insist on proper breeding data.

Excellent racing and fast time is the way a despatch sums up the racing at Woodstock, N.B., on Wednesday. The weather was beautiful and the track fast. Wendal Wathan won the 2.22 Trot and Pace and the 2.23 Trot. The former with Dude Potempkin, contending horses were Bobelwyn, winner of the first heat in 2:10 3-4, Keystone, 3, 2, 2, Northern Prince, 4, 3, 5. Dude's heats were in 2:14 1-2, 2:12 1-2.

The 2.14 Trot and Pace was won by Direct Braden, although Mac Forbes, driven by the veteran John Willard won the third heat. Earl Avery was 2, 2, 2 with Brave Arion. Calumet Charles, who was an awfully good horse last season, was fourth and drawn, time 2:10, 2:12, 2:15. The 2:23 Trot was won by Sequence, Miss Uhlun Volo winning the third heat. There was quite a big field. Joe Watts was fifth, driven by Earl Avery and Oh Boy Fischer sixth in the summary, time 2:15 1-2, 2:15, 2:17 1-4, nothing wonderful for that class of horses, we would say.

Sables in Halifax, Middleton, Truro and North Sydney have formed a Nova Scotia Harness Racing Circuit. It was learned Thursday. The strings will meet in North Sydney July 22, Middleton Aug. 5, Truro Aug. 12 and will come to the Prince Edward Island Exhibition at Charlottetown, Aug. 18.

The second days' racing at Woodstock, N.B., on Thursday was witnessed by a large crowd of fans who saw the track record beaten twice in the afternoon in one of the most sensational free-for-all races on a Maritime track in recent years. Bud Wenger, who sported a record of 2:06½ when sold early this spring for a small sum, was thought to be all washed up, but in the hands of Earl Avery lowered his record and besting the crack pacer Mildred May and the two minute Zombro Hanover, also The Great Guy, who was in fine form Bud Wenger's two heats in 2:05½ and 2:06½ are wonderful efforts and if he retains his form he should be worthy opposition for the best free-for-alls in the land.

The 2.17 Trot and Pace was another conking race and Johnny Conroy surprised the experts by winning with Hanover Courier. In the first heat he sprinted past Silver Evans, 2:06, and the second beat Dolly Azoff out in a rousing finish. Horses winning two heats were sent to the barn. R. M. Webber of Saint Stephen was the starter and made a good job of it.

Mandate To Launch War Expected

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NANKING, July 11 (Friday)—A virtual mandate to launch war against recalcitrant Kwangsi province was expected to be handed to Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek at an emergency session today of the Kuomintang central executive committee.

One hundred and fifty Kuomintang stalwarts from all parts of China—loyal to the National government and willing to follow every Chiang Kai-Shek bidding without questioning—comprised the session called to formulate Nanking's reply to the insurgency of the southwestern Chinese government. Kwangsi province has been lead-

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
