## Tug Averts Swamping During Gale This Week

A water-filled galley caused a work stoppage on the tug Canso earlier this week when water rushed in through a broken port hole during coaling operations at Wood Islands. The New Brunswick tug is engaged with Dredge No. 20 in dredging operations at Wood Islands and at the time was being loaded with coal for the next two-week period. High seas due to the severe weather at the time poured water through the port light which had been broken and flooded the galley and adjacent area. When the accident was noticed the hole was quickly filled and pumps on the dredge were put to work to pump out the water from the tug. The work was completed in about two hours and operations were resumed.

## Aid On Grain Is Announced

OTTAWA (CP) — A four-point plan of federal aid to Prairie farmers with snowed - in grain crops, including acreage payments shared by the provinces and a speedup of prairie farm assistance payments, was announced Friday by Prime Minister Diefenbaker. He said in an interview he could give no estimate of the total cost. That would depend on provincial reaction to the main proposal: A 50-50 split with the provinces on payments of up to \$3 an acre - with a maximum of \$600 to each farmer - in cases where a farmer has been prevented by snow from harvesting 50 per cent or more of his grain.

## Air Pollution Measure Is Scientist's Objective

OTTAWA (CP) — Canadian scientists are attempting to combine the techniques of weather forecasting with information on air pollution in major cities to map the extent and degree of pollution across the country. So far, they have had considerable success in one area in forecasting pollution levels and are extending their network for collecting information to other centres.

## S'side Traffic Is Discussed

SUMMERSIDE — The Street Committee of the Summerside Town Council and the Retail Merchants Committee of the Board of Trade met Thursday in the civic building to discuss the possibility of relieving the traffic congestion on the business streets of Summerside. A short time ago news items appeared in the papers stating that consideration was being given to making Water and Fitzroy streets one-way streets. This suggestion did not meet the approval and they suggested to the Street Committee that signal lights be installed to ascertain the cost of installing lights at all the main intersections.

## MIRACLE MINER IS RECOVERING

SPRINGHILL, N.S. (CP) — Joseph McDonald, a Springhill miner, is recovering in hospital here from a broken leg. McDonald spent several weeks in hospital after he emerged from the No. 2 mine of the Cumberland Railway and Coal Company where he was trapped 6½ days before being rescued along with 11 other men. His right leg was badly broken. Shortly after he was released from hospital, McDonald had his appendix out in an emergency operation. He was admitted to hospital again a week ago. He slipped on his crutches and broke his right leg again.

## PREPARE MAPS

Information now sent to the air - pollution services of the health department's occupational health division is being used to prepare maps of air - pollution climatology in collaboration with the transport department's meteorological services. Behind this movement is the possibility that as cities grow and industrialization increases the effects of air pollution may endanger health and damage buildings, exposed materials and crops. A knowledge of the pollution levels therefore may lead to better city planning and industrial site selection. Dr. Morris Katz, consultant for the air-pollution services, sees this as a possibility. Canada, he says, already has had a few warning signs of the type of smog that blankets Los Angeles County.

## YOUTH IRRITATIONS

These have included reports of eye irritations in the Sarnia, Ont., area, vegetation damage in southern Ontario and abnormal cracking of rubber tires and rubber products, also in southern Ontario. Dr. Katz says photochemical pollution is a growing problem that is likely to reach greater proportions with the development of petrochemical industries and increased use of motor vehicles of all kinds. So far as is known man hazard to man is irritation to the skin and eyes, but there may be other effects that would make it desirable for provinces and municipalities to control or prevent air pollution from motor vehicles and other sources.

## Frontier Of Himalaya Guaranteed By Nehru

NEW DELHI (Reuters)—Prime Minister Nehru pledged Friday to defend the independent state of Nepal from Chinese Communist aggression. This means India now is committed to protecting the entire 3,000-mile Himalayan frontier, including the Indian border, Nepal and the Indian-protected states of Bhutan and Sikkim. Nehru's unexpected pledge to Nepal was made in Parliament amid rumors that a 10,000-strong division of Indian troops already is moving into the kingdom and two more divisions may follow. India says that since last August Chinese Communist forces arbitrarily have taken over at least 6,000 square miles of Indian soil. The dispute reached a climax Oct. 21 in a frontier clash costing the lives of seven Indian frontier police officers.

## CAUSES SENSATION

Hitherto, India had promised to defend Bhutan and Sikkim from Chinese aggression. But Nehru's promise to extend the guarantee to Nepal caused a parliamentary sensation. At first, members and reporters thought he had made a slip of the tongue. An official later confirmed Nehru had deliberately named Nepal, a mountain kingdom of 54,362 square miles to the west of Bhutan and bordering India and Tibet. The spokesman said Nehru's statement on Nepal was "in accordance with an agreement be-
