THE OPPOSITION WILL RESIST

The Gerrymander to the Last Extremity

ONTARIO MEMBERS PROTEST AGAINST THE BILL.

Mr. Blair Expounds and Explains the Grand Trunk Contract.

OTTAWA, June 2.—At the Opposition caucus held yesterday the party reached a unanimous conclusion that the Gerrymander must be resisted to the last extremity.

Ontario Conservative members protest strongly against the bill which they say is grossly unfair, dishonest, inconsistent and hypocritical.

American Adulterations

LONDON, May 31.—The Telegraph announces that in articles of food imported from America are many adulterations. Official analysts have made the appalling discovery that tarred rope is freely utilized in the manufacture of the ginger of commerce; that pulverized clay is lavishly mixed with the flour supplied to unsuspecting Britons "for household use."

Corn-starch figures as a copious adulterant of powered sugar; ground-up cocanut shells are extensively sold as prime buckwheat flour; jellies are made of apple-cores and parings, blended with glucose, and butter is a compound of tallow and marrow. Condensed milk on the other hand, is preserved by means of wood alcohol, which—being strenuously poisonous—is admirably calculated to abridge the lives of its unwary customers.

"Despite the recent return of Anglo-American amity," says the Telegraph, "and its tempting promise of an informal alliance, in the coming by and by, between the two great English speaking-nations, we are only too well aware that the time-worn axiom, 'There is no friendship in business,' still holds good on both sides of the Atlantic, and will probably continue to do so until the crack of doom. Nevertheless, we cannot help thinking that those of our American cousins who occupy themselves with the preparation of food intended for our consumption might temper adulteration with mercy."

THE DREYFUS CASE.

Conclusion of the Court of Cassation.

PARIS, May 31.—Amid cries of "Bravo!" which President Mazeau did not attempt to suppress, M. Ballot de Beaulieu, yesterday afternoon declared, with solemn impressiveness, his conviction that the work of Dreyfus or Esterhazy, is not necessary to invoke other facts. Here he made a pause, which seemed to the eager listeners unbearably long. Then looking round the court, he added, in measured and impressive tones:—

"But is it his work? I proclaim to you that I have acquired the conviction that the dossier was written, not by Dreyfus, but by Esterhazy."

The Eastern Situation.

LONDON, May 31.—The Shanghai correspondent of the Mail says Japan is assuming a threatening attitude toward Russia and is sympathizing with China, while China is determined to resist Italy seizing Sun-mun and any further German encroachment at Shan-Tung. The British squadron, it is said, will shortly assemble Wei-Hai-Wei.

Duchy of Saxe-Coburg.

LONDON, May 31.—A despatch to the Morning Post from Berlin says that since the declaration of the Duke of Connaught, in which he expressed himself as prepared to assume the succession to the throne of the Grand Duchy of Saxe-Coburg and Gotha, now occupied by his brother, the Duke of Edinburgh, arrangements have been made by which the succession will pass to the Duke of Albany, a nephew of the Duke of Connaught, the latter renouncing it for himself and family.

A WEAK ARGUMENT.

SIR,—I was particularly struck by the ridiculousness of one of the arguments in this morning's Guardian. The writer says: "These men (the liquor dealers) feel better than they did a week ago. There is a sense of dignity and respectability about them that is new." Why so? Last week and for the past two years the liquor traffic has been legal and licensed in this city under certain conditions; it is now legal and licensed under additional restrictions,—plus the payment into the Provincial treasury of \$200 a year. Before the payment of the \$200, liquor dealers were free if they observed the conditions: now they are free if they observe the harder conditions. That their case is in any way improved none—but a blind fanatic can imagine; and certainly they have no additional reason to think well of themselves.

But I quite agree with you, Mr. Editor, that the money ought to go into the city treasury—not into that of the Province. PUBLIC OPINION.
