A Singular Craft.

A vessel has been invented by Mr. Nordenfled which can be propelled both on the water and under the water. Its rate of speed on the surface is fifteen knots an hour; when it dives it can remain under the water with its crew of seven men for five hours, moving at the rate of four knots an hour. This submarine ship is no toy. She is 125 feet in length, with other dimensions to correspond. When it is required to submerge her the funnels are dropped and capped over, tanks in her hold are filled with water and two screw propellers, which work so as to draw the vessel down, are set in motion. The fires are extinguished by steam, the depth of the descent is ascertained by an ordinary pressure gauge, and the weight and buoyancy so adjusted that if any accident takes place to the machinery the vessel will slowly rise to the surface. The motive power while the vessel is under water is steam, stored up under a pressure of a hundred pounds to the square inch. It has been found that the air confined in the vessel is sufficient to give the seamen who form the crew all that they require for breathing purposes for a longer period than they can remain submerged. The British Admiralty have been invited to witness the performance of this singular craft, which its inventor believes will revolutionize naval warfare.

A Comparison.

The Ottawa Citizen says: "When the curtain went down on the last scene in the parliamentary drama last night, those who watched the inception and progress of legislative action, could not help contrasting the mental calibre of the ministers who control the destiny of the state, with those who posed as leaders on the opposite side of the house. On the one hand the ministry have been studiously directing their efforts towards raising monuments to the future greatness of an industrious people, and revising methods for the development of vast natural resources; on the other the intellect of a party has been concentrated in an attempt to belittle every move in the march of progress and to blacken the reputation of men whose lives have been devoted to the best interests of the nation. One has calmly taken advantage of the ever changing conditions of national life and harmonized the whole; the other little inexperienced youth has viewed hard facts through the lime-light of fancy."

No Hypothecation.

AN INVESTOR CANNOT HYPOTHECATE STOCK HELD BY HIM IN TRUST.

The judgment of the supreme court of Canada in the case of Sweeney vs. the Bank of Montreal has been sustained by the judicial committee of the privy council. This affirms the principle that an investor cannot hypothecate for his own benefit stock held by him in trust. Miss Sweeney, of Montreal, entrusted Mr. James Rose, brother of Sir John Rose, with some shares in the Montreal rolling mills, for investment. Mr. Rose hypothecated the shares to the bank of Montreal as security for money advanced to himself. Miss Sweeney brought suit against the bank to recover their shares. The courts of Quebec decided in favor of the bank on the ground that under French law trusts were not recognized, but the supreme court reversed the judgment of the Lower Canadian courts, and the decision of the supreme court has been sustained by the privy council.

Chief Justice Cameron.

The late Chief Justice, Sir Matthew Crooks Cameron, who died at Toronto on Sunday night, was 65 years of age, having been born in Dundas in 1822. He was called to the bar of Ontario Province in 1849, was created foreign consul in 1863, was elevated to the bench in 1878, and was raised to the position of chief justice of common pleas division in 1884. During his practice at the bar he was acknowledged to be without a peer in criminal cases. He was a strong Liberal-Conservative in politics and held office in the government of the Hon. John Sandfield Macdonald. It is only a few weeks ago that the honor of knighthood was conferred upon him. He leaves three sons and three daughters.

A Briber Punished.

The hoodlums of New York and other cities have been taught another severe lesson in the conviction of Jacob Sharp. Sharp was not an alderman, but he was a briber of aldermen. He tempted them to betray the trust reposed in them by the people, and now it is seen that the law can reach the tempter as well as the traitor. The spectacle of Sharp, a rich man, having the handling of millions of dollars, being sent to the penitentiary like any other malefactor, for "fixing" aldermen and making the way smooth for contractors to rob a municipality, will, no doubt, have a wholesome effect on corruptionists of his class everywhere.

He seems to have the business very much at heart, and it is no wonder. He has one or two very fine colts of the Abdallah breed, which he refused some very handsome figures for. At the close of the lecture he was applauded, and the meeting closed by singing the National Anthem.

The crops in this eastern part of the Island are looking very fine—the wheat crop in particular, thanks to some of our energetic farmers for introducing the lime as a fertilizer.

The codfishing has been fairly good, and the hardy sons of Neptune may be seen in nearly all sorts of weather overhauling their trawls, being prompted and encouraged by the indications of a good price.

Inquest.

An inquest was held at Launching on Tuesday, the 28th day of June, before Wm. Norton, Esq., one of the coroners for King's County, on the body of a man found on Launching Beach. The jury, having been sworn, proceeded to view the body, which was identified as that of William Howlett, late of Annandale, Lot 56, who was missing since the 26th day of March. After hearing the evidence they found the following verdict: "Found drowned on Launching Beach." The jury gave, or instructed the coroner to give, their fees to the poor widow who is almost broken hearted at her irreparable loss. He left no family.

Sir Geo. Trevelyan Explains.

Sir George O. Trevelyan publishes a letter on the controversy of statements recently made by Joseph Chamberlain and other liberal unionists that the only obstacle to re-union in the liberal party was the refusal of the Gladstonians to make any concessions in their Irish programme. The Gladstonians have, says Sir George, made concessions in all the disputed points and therefore interpose no obstacle to a re-union of the party. The liberal unionists, he concludes, will be unable to destroy liberals, but the re-union of the liberal party would serve to moderate its policy.
