Two Fined \$125 In Driving Cases

Donald L. Rogerson, Victoria, and Lester C. Lewis, Howland, each charged with drunken driving, both pleaded to guilty to impaired driving and were each fined \$125 and costs or 30 days in City Court yesterday. They were arraigned before Magistrate A. James Haslam, QC.

Francis Quinn, city, was fined \$50 and costs or 30 days on a charge of obstructing a police officer and Magistrate Haslam warned the accused this was a serious offence and that the penalty would be more severe if it happened again. The Magistrate pointed out it is possible to be imprisoned for two years on the offence.

William J. Fisher, Hazelbrook, Crilly Burke, city and Colin M. Birt, Beach Point were each charged with going through red traffic lights and similar fines of \$10 and costs were given.

Cyril Bryanton, Brackley Point, was fined \$20 and costs or 10 days on a speeding charge. There were five drunk and incapable cases on yesterday's docket. Four were convicted and one man had his case dismissed. Three city youths were each

assessed \$20 and costs or 20 days on disorderly conduct charges. One man was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days on a charge of illegal possession of liquor.

One Islander In Hay Classes

HALIFAX (Special) — Alton Rodd, North Milton, was the only Prince Edward Island farmer to compete in the hay classes at the Atlantic Winter Fair and he placed second in legume hay, and in legume hay-grass mixtures.

Gordon Knowles, Newport RR2, Hants County, Nova Scotia won both classes.

Mrs. E.S. Putnam, 80 Greenfield Avenue, Charlottetown placed second with an oil painting in one of the appropriate art classes at the fair.

Fill Dumping Discontinued

Because of the possibility of weakening the present bridge which is used as a detour, the dumping of fill at the site of the new bridge in Morell has been discontinued.

Officials of the department of highways inspected the bridge yesterday and decided to stop further addition of fill to the new bridge until next spring or summer. They are not in favor of a detour, which would include some two miles of unpaved road, at this time of year due to the difficulty in keeping it in proper maintenance.

The fill for the new bridge is running against the piles of the old bridge and if continued would weaken them seriously.

Shooting Case Set To Nov. 17

Charged with shooting a loaded revolver at another person with intent to wound, Marlene Frances Ferguson of Hampton appeared before James B. Johnston, QC, yesterday and had her case adjourned to Nov. 17 to fix a date for preliminary hearing.

The accused, represented by Lester P. O'Donnell, appeared in Queens County Magistrate's Court.

Donald Joseph Noonan, Borden, charged with criminal negligence in the operation of a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquor at an excessive rate of speed on the left side of the highway showing a reckless or wanton regard for the safety of others, elected to be tried by magistrate. He was remanded to Nov. 10 when his plea will be taken. Bail is to stand. Lester O'Donnell represented the accused.

Douglas Joseph Strickland, Marshfield, and Barry Joseph Gass, City, appeared on two joint charges of break, entry and theft into Boswell's Service station and Nelson's Service Station. The two were remanded to Nov. 10 on both counts to fix a date for the preliminary hearing. Bail is to stand. Counsel for the accused was Gordon Tweedy.

A Winsloe man, Allison Edmund Carr, charged with failing to register a motor vehicle, had his case adjourned to Nov. 24 to fix a date for trial. He had previously pleaded not guilty.

One accused was fined \$20 and costs or 30 days on a charge of illegal possession of liquor and two other accused had their cases adjourned on similar charges to Nov. 10 and Nov. 24.

Flight Control Centre Ready Early Next Year

MONCTON — Technicians from Canadian National Telecommunications are at work installing equipment for the new Moncton Airports air traffic control centre — heart of flight control in Atlantic Canada.

Setting up the equipment by the CNT crew involves installation of the men of some 12,000 cable pairs, 900 relays, dozens of associated units and an estimated 250,000 connections.

The new control centre communications will be completed and leased to the Department of Transport early in the new year. Air traffic controllers will move into it from their present facilities with no interruption in operation.

The Moncton centre acts as a marshalling area stretching from the American border to Newfoundland, from Sable Island to 25 miles east of Quebec City and into Labrador.

It also serves as man-in-the-middle for international air flights out of New York, taking the flight from the Boston Control Centre, passing it to the men in Gandor, as the plane makes its way overseas.

The facilities being installed by CNT permit the air traffic controllers to contact all departments of transport airports in the region as well as maintain contact with such essential services as the meteorological office.

Also being provided and installed by CNT is a 50-line private telephone exchange for use by the controllers in their work and equipment for a new department of transport controllers' training school.

CNT land lines to such centres as Sydney, Yarmouth and Mont Joli carry the conversations between controllers and pilots of aircraft passing through the air. This provides instant contact and reliability of communication between the pilot and his control centre.

'Topo Gigio' Here Saturday

To a child, the best known Italian of modern times is not a person, but a little foam-rubber mouse with a squeaky voice named Topo Gigio.

The little puppet captured the hearts of children of all ages in appearances on the Ed Sullivan Show, and now he comes to the screen in his first full length motion picture, "The Magic World of Topo Gigio." The film is booked into Confederation Centre Theatre as a children's special on Saturday, Nov. 6, for three performances.

The film also introduces Topo's girl friend Rosie and his buddy the little worm Giovanni and many other delightful characters.

The plot involves the efforts of Topo and his friends to aid a kindly old puppeteer who competes for audiences with a villainous magician.

"The Magic World of Topo Gigio" has been described as "an imaginative excursion into the fields of puppetry and magic, as well as a happy example of screen special effects work at its best."

The piloting cruises are actually courses—in the many different aspects of boating, covering everything from boating terminology to coastal navigation.

The intricacy of government rules and regulations regarding boats, is delved into as are the cause and effects of tides. The magnetic compass and the chart were explained and the uses of them are illustrated. There will be tips on boat maintenance and techniques, boat safety and first aid.

The courses will be run every Wednesday evening throughout the winter by the Charlottetown Squadron of the Canadian Power Squadrons and are open to anyone interested in boating, regardless of whether they are members of a yacht club or not, at a very small cost to cover texts and charts.
