### SHAW-DIEFENBAKER TEAM FALLS APART

Premier Shaw's frantic rush to bring on an election with a non-confidence vote in the Diefenbaker Government, Mr. Shaw knows, as the great majority of Canadians know, that the Tory Days in Ottawa are numbered. If he can help it, the Island leader is not going to be dragged down by his partner John. Therefore the quick appeal to the electors in the dirt hole which they will not be able to trap into which they are being led, Mr. Shaw cannot appeal any longer to keep the O'ttawa-Island team together. The present O'ttawa Government is a shadow Government, existing on the charity of the two minor parties, the Scottish Party and the New Democratic Party. They call the tune and John Diefenbaker follows.

Right now Diefenbaker's hopes of remaining at O'ttawa are as low as the price of potatoes and that, our farmers know, is very low indeed. Unable to count on the O'ttawa friends any longer, Mr. Shaw is going to the country in desperation.

This however might succeed if Islanders — who are just as well informed as any people in Canada — were so painfully aware of the terrible condition brought about by John Diefenbaker and Walter Shaw. Mr. Shaw cannot evade responsibility because he has insisted again and again that the Provincial Party and the present Tory Government at O'ttawa work as a team.

Let's look at the team's record on unemployment. Last winter, when the Islanders were drawing unemployment insurance benefits, the largest number of unemployed in this figure represents over thirty percent of the workers in this small province, the highest percentage in Canada. Percentage unemployment in the United States runs about five percent and in Europe much less than that. Quite a record for a rich, young, and vigorous Canada. At the present moment — and the worst is still ahead — four out of five of a class of John's "hundred Canadians" are out of work.

"The United Team" that Mr. Shaw attached continuously in the Diefenbaker Government is not scoring any votes and has certainly not giving Islanders anything to cheer about. This Mr. Shaw will have to present himself to the voters as a personal effort. John is no help.

Gone are the days when Diefenbaker put his great "Fellow Canadians" which fooled thousands of Canadians including Mr. Shaw himself. At a time when he was backed up by the Diefenbaker-led full-throated enthusiasm.

Islanders and all Canadians who are not led by Diefenbaker mate is more of a politician than a statesman, more of a teatime scribbler than a leader. At the height of Diefenbaker's popularity as a TV entertainer no one knew or could believe, that he would lead Canada to the edge of financial disaster, to austerity and light money, and not to prosperity. Certainly Mr. Shaw was a believer because he joined his fortunes with Diefenbaker, and made that goddam one of the principal issues in the last Provincial Election. Can he ignore Diefenbaker's election?

The farmers in this Province were among the chief victims of Diefenbaker's high-pressure tactics. It is a principal part of Diefenbaker's political game to the farmers. This was why never before in the history of the Province has the farmer been so badly runned by the government. Now they are being regulated by the Ontario team of Walter and John that is leading the farmers to a truth and struggle as never before. The farmers' heads above water and make it possible. This is the result of Shaw-Diefenbaker.

Will Mr. Shaw once again make Diefenbaker and his Government the principal issue in his platform for this election? It is very very doubtful. It would mean that Diefenbaker would be the burden of John's vote-getting. The local Provincial leader is too well informed not to know that Diefenbaker would be a vote loser. The team idea is a vote drawback, and no one would be so foolish as to vote for the party to the party.

## Fire Watch Maintained at Headquarters of UN

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — In a sparkling presentation, United Nations headquarters a man sits in front of a row of light panels waiting for a lethal flash which hopes will never come.

At eight-hour intervals other members enter the chamber and take up the lonely vigil.

These monitors watch around the clock for the warning light which would indicate fire has broken out in one of the vital communications rooms of the \$100,000,000 secretariat building and assembly hall.

Fire is only one hazard kept under surveillance in the basement room which is the nerve centre of the UN's complex safety control system.

To ensure their safety, the UN keeps 12 professional firemen on duty at all times. A team of guards who evacuate the building without panic or confusion in case a blaze does break out.

keeps the vast establishment going.

Should one of the eight night security guards who patrol the building fall ill or run into foul play, a waiting fire truck would checkpoint would trip an alarm telling the brain he was behind the door.

**SOUNDS CODE ALARM**

A wisp of smoke drifting through the library building on records room would start a network of horns clearing in code words for the night investigators directly to the trouble point.

Fire is not the only hazard kept under surveillance in the basement room which is the nerve centre of the UN's complex safety control system.

To ensure their safety, the UN keeps 12 professional firemen on duty at all times. A team of guards who evacuate the building without panic or confusion in case a blaze does break out.

The elaborate program has paid off. Aside from an occasional wastebasket fire, there has been only one real blaze in the East River headquarters.

And that was put out so quickly only a handful of people knew about it.

"The fire broke out four years ago when a contractor was decorating an office on the fifth floor," said Louis Mayan, UN security chief. "A spark apparently touched off a can of paint and suddenly the whole room was ablaze."

**TAKE QUICK ACTION**

The system flashed word to the nerve centre and firemen reached the scene in three minutes. A half-hour later the fire was out, leaving about \$4,000 damage but no casualties.

"The department, in operation 16 years, has all the equipment of a regular fire department.

As a reporter asked questions in the nerve centre, the phone rang and the monitor on duty answered.

"One of the wine stewards," he told the centre control chief, Joseph Cahill. "He's going back and suddenly the whole room was ablaze."

As he spoke, a panel light began to twinkle alarm.

"See," Cahill declared, "We often make sure the liquor is safe."

## Revolt by Air Force Crises in Guatemala

GUATEMALA CITY (AP) — Air force units revolted Sunday and sent warplanes strafing runs at army barracks and the presidential palace but were quickly suppressed, the government reported. It said the rebels only by chance missed the capital.

A government omnibus asserted the uprising was backed by "money from Fidel Castro" of Cuba. Ydigoras' 67-year-old army general, directed military operations that crushed the revolt.

The Red Cross reported two persons were killed and the fire department reported 30 vehicles wounded, mostly by bullets from planes attacking the army barracks.

There were no reports of army casualties.

Officials said only two planes of the Guatemalan air force took part in the raids, and that air force units remaining loyal joined the army in holding the barracks.

The communiqué asserted that Ydigoras had the full support of the army and the situation was under control.

**NAME REBELS**

The government said four colonels led the revolt, including Col. Oscar Giron Ferrero, often mentioned as a possible candidate in the 1963 elections.

Other names named were Carlos Marroquin, Marco Asturias Sobral and Jose Gonzalez Baines. It was reported they either had fled to neighboring El Salvador or had taken refuge in the Salvadorean Embassy.

The government decreed a state of emergency throughout the country.

From the moment the fighting between army and air force broke out all roads and air force to the airport were closed.

Most of the 1962 uprisings and

other disorders in Guatemala are blamed by the government on Castro supporters and Communists. Ydigoras is an outspoken foe of Cuban Premier Castro.

(In Washington, Guatemalan Ambassador Carlos Alcora said the uprising was led by three air force colonels and informants indicated they had the backing of leftists in Guatemala. He said the three colonels had fled and the situation was under control. He blamed the revolt on anger arising from passage of an income tax law Sunday.)

**BRAWL CLOGS CITY**

WASHINGTON (AP) — A massive fire-flood engulfed the thousands of spectators and chanted through a five block area after the city's Thanksgiving Day prep football championship Thursday. For an hour the battering—mostly teenagers in a crowd of 50,000 at district stadium—lough each other and 100 police. At least 38 persons were reported injured.
