Russia's Pasternak Said Cheered, Kissed

MOSCOW (AP)—Boris Pasternak, Russian poet and novelist, has reappeared in public. He turned up unannounced at a concert of the New York Philharmonic and cheered, applauded and kissed conductor Leonard Bernstein.

Pasternak had lived in seclusion many months since he was awarded the 1958 Nobel Prize for literature after publication abroad of his novel Doctor Zhivago. It was banned from publication in the Soviet Union and he rejected the prize after first accepting it.

Pasternak appeared in good health. He told reporters he is living well and working at capacity.

But he was too concerned immediately with Bernstein and the Philharmonic music to pause for discussion of the controversial Doctor Zhivago, or to say what he is writing now.

Making his way to Bernstein's dressing room at intermission, Pasternak said: "I've never felt so close to the aesthetic truth."

"When I hear you I know why you were born," he told Bernstein.

"I only want to listen, not speak."
 Enjoying every minute of it was Bernstein's father Samuel Joseph Bernstein of Boston who arrived recently for the final scenes of his son's triumph in Russia.
 The father already has had a joyous reunion with a long lost brother who has been an engineer in charge of Siberian coal mines and now is retired.
 (While the Soviet Union

never took any open official action to punish Pasternak for the political shafts and implications of Doctor Zhivago, he was made an outcast by the Soviet Writers' Union and branded a pig by former colleagues. His surprise emergence in public came amid a surge of expedient leading to Premier Khrushchev's departure Monday on his historic mission to America and talks with Pres-

ident Eisenhower. The Pasternak case has been a rallying cry for demonstrators against Soviet oppressions of freedom.
 Leonard Bernstein, the boy wonder of both classical and Broadway stage music — and a fair hand at jazz as well — gave a special explanatory performance of the philharmonic for Soviet students musicians, composers and teachers.
