Heather Burke Tops Field In P.E.I. Dance Festival

A Charlottetown girl, Heather Burke, received the highest mark in any class last night in the P.E.I. Dance Festival being held at the West Kent School. Adjudicator Irene Waldie, from Rawdon, Quebec, awarded Miss Burke 89 for her performance in class 65, highland fling—17 years and over. The only other competitor in this class, Shirley Linkletter, Summerside, received a mark of 74.

So far in the two days in which the festival has been functioning there have been very few marks in the 80's. The greatest proportion of the marks have been situated in the 70's.

Up to last night the competitions included numerous Scottish dances, but today the festival will be composed greatly of tap dancing. The final day of the festival, Thursday, will continue along the same pattern as today's competitions, and there will be only very few Scottish or Irish classes scheduled.

been frustrated. Just eight minutes after the Atlas roared into life with its red-orange tail of flame, the word came that the Gemini flight had been scrubbed.

"We have lost the Agena bird," said mission control. "We don't know exactly what happened to it. The Gemini will not fly today."

SPACEMEN WAITING
The astronauts were in their spacecraft barely 50 minutes, entering just about 20 minutes before the 113-foot Atlas-Agena roared spaceward. They were to speed off in pursuit-propelled by their Titan-II rocket an hour and 39 minutes later.

It was the second time that the record space walk had been thwarted by rocket failure. March 16, just after docking with an Agena, the Gemini-3 was forced to pull away as the ship began to go into a wild spin. Pilot David R. Scott was to have performed the solo walk in space just 12 hours after that problem cropped up and cut the mission short.

It also was the second time trouble had hit the Gemini-3 mission. Staffed and Cernan, originally the back-up crew, took over the mission when prime pilots Elliott Sze and Charles A. Bassett were killed in a plane crash at St. Louis in February.

The Atlas-Agena combination that was lost costs about \$12,000,000 but other costs are hard to determine—for instance the cost of re-deploying recovery forces which might run as much as \$1,000,000.

pected to "bail out" builders when they were running into a little trouble for the first summer season in 15 years.

Mr. Nicholson said private mortgage money for housing was plentiful until July 1, when it became apparent to the government a squeeze was coming. Central Mortgage and Housing Corp. sent bulletins to this effect to builders.

He scoffed at Mr. Hees, former Conservative trade minister, for saying an increase in the NHA interest rate on mortgages to 6 1/2 per cent had cut banks out of the field.

Anybody with any knowledge of the Bank Act would realize banks couldn't carry housing mortgages.

Mr. Nicholson said the housing problem has been brought about "by the free action of private lending institutions" and is a direct result of a boom.

Ban On Synthetic Hormone Urged By Conservative MP

OTTAWA (CP)—Percy Noble (PC—Grey North), a mink rancher, told the Commons agriculture committee Tuesday a law should be passed banning the use of stilbestrol, a synthetic hormone in feeds for livestock and poultry, because of its possible effect on humans.

He said mink which were fed the hormone were sterilized, and he wondered what its effect might be on human health and reproduction.

Dr. S. C. Barry, deputy minister of the federal agriculture department, said the hormone promotes rapid development of poultry and livestock, but the department has done no research on the possible effects on humans. That is a question for the food and drug division of the federal health department, he added.

Members of the committee expressed concern about the story told by Mr. Noble. Several herds of mink had been virtually wiped out because of stilbestrol.

Investigation had not proved conclusively whether the hormone had been fed to the animals improperly or whether they were just unusually susceptible to its effects.

What effect does stilbestrol have on people when it is fed to cattle and poultry?" he asked. "It sterilized the mink. What's it doing to humans?"

that it is used by humans for the same purpose."
Dr. J. C. Woodward, associate director-general of the department's research branch, said stilbestrol is used because it improves livestock growth in relation to food consumed.
Dr. Barry said the agriculture department does regulate livestock feeds, but leaves questions of human food purity primarily to the health department. At a later meeting of the agriculture committee, Dr. Barry said, agriculture department officials will testify on the Feedstuffs Act.

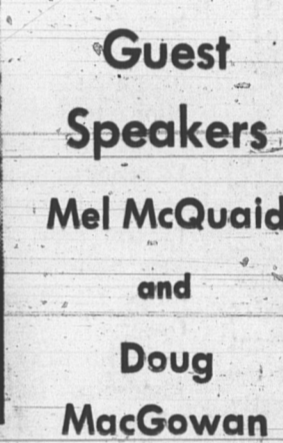
