**Session Prorogued, 54 Bills Get Assent**

Royal assent was given to 56 bills yesterday morning as Lieutenant-Governor W.I. MacEachern announced the prorogation of the session of the 50th General Assembly of Prince Edward Island. At the arrival of His Honor at the front of the Provincial Building, a composite honor guard was drawn up from 2 Militia Group, and red carpeting decked the hallway on the route the Lieutenant-Governor took to the Assembly Chamber. His Honor entered the chamber at four minutes past 11 and 20 minutes later he had completed his official business by closing the session. The session began Feb. 11 and for the most part was a quiet one, with both parties expressing willingness to cooperate to get the business of the House completed. There were some hot moments, however, particularly when some controversial legislation as amendments to the Liquor Control Act, the Prince of Wales College Act, the Summer Incubation Act and the P.E.I. Industrial Corporation Act was under consideration. Major pieces of legislation passed were the Highway Traffic Act, the Prince of Wales College Act, the Credit Union Act, and acts to provide for operation and maintenance of the Palenets of Confederation Memorial Building, the setting up of a number of new corporations in the province and an act to restrict the use of poisonous pesticides and chemical sprays. A number of existing acts were amended, including the Acts of Incorporation of Charlottetown and Summerside. Another budgetary deficit was forecast for the next fiscal year, and debate on the budget brought forth opposition charges of wastefulness and extravagance. In his prorogation speech, the Lieutenant-Governor thanked the members. "At the conclusion of your legislative duties, I have much pleasure in congratulating you on the earnest and thorough manner with which you have applied yourselves to the public business, and upon the useful measures which you have enacted. I thank you for the Liberal provision you have made for the carrying on of the public services of this province, and I assure you that the money appropriated will be carefully and economically spent. "May the hand of Divine Providence, which has guided you during your labors of the session, protect you during the recess and bring you back to another session, endowed with the same spirit of devotion to duty as you have already displayed."

**Claims Press Favors Authoritarian Gov't**

Health Minister Hubert MacNeill, according to an Evening Patriot editorial of Feb. 28 entitled "where the government seems to be of the people," which advocated the government lead the people rather than the people lead it, charged that the press is for an authoritarian type of government. Mr. MacNeill was speaking during the debate on the motion for supply in the Legislature Monday morning. "The paper feels the citizens of Charlottetown did wrong in voting against fluoridation so said, referring to a plebiscite held here some four years ago. "But this controversy was waded in the city," he continued, "suggesting that the newspapers 'oversold it' in an attempt to have the people vote to have the city water fluoridated."

**LET PEOPLE DECIDE.** Mr. MacNeill pointed out that at the time, "not one single person spoke against it" including doctors, dentists and public health officials. "I believe when a large number of people in the province vote against something they are expressing a bill to deny people the right of legal aid when arrested."

**Nine Employer Applications Are Submitted**

Labor Minister, Allan J. MacEachern, revealed in the House of Commons, Ottawa Monday, that nine applications have been received from P.E.I. employers for assistance under the older workers employment and training incentive program up to the end of February. Mr. MacEachern reported that 936 workers had been hired under the program. Ontario led with 603 applications. In answer to a question from Health MacEachern, MP for Queens, the civil service commission stated that the department of national revenue has not reported any need for casual help as customs excise officers in the provinces of Prince Edward Island, Newfoundland and Manitoba. Competitions to recruit university students for casual employment of this nature are advertised only in provinces where it is expected such help will be required. It was noted.

He succeeds Pierre Hetu who is going to Europe for studies.

**OWN DEPARTMENT** In speaking of the expenditures of his own department, Dr. MacNeill pointed out that the increase from \$7,000 in 1958 to \$3,300,000 last year was due largely to hospital insurance and that the expenditure of the department itself had increased to only \$1,700,000. The minister said he was pleased with the progress at Sherwood Hospital for retarded children. He told the House that a specialist recently sent from Toronto to give advice to hospital had said he was taking back more information than he had given. Dr. MacNeill pointed out that the salary scale for nurses and other hospital employees was gradually increasing. The salary for a registered nurse has increased from \$2,600 in 1959 to \$3,219 this year, he said, but added that it was only 11 per cent higher than Nova Scotia's and about 50 per cent lower than a B.C.'s. He forecast an increase in future costs because nurses were demanding a 40-hour week and he predicted this would come about "in another year."
