

Cypriot Rebel Escapes His Captors In Blazing Fight

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — A Greek Cypriot rebel escaped British captors Friday in a blazing hospital gun fight that killed five persons.

Hadjigeorgiou, 25, made the third getaway of his career when two British police sergeants took him from prison to the Nicosia General Hospital for treatment.

Three other insurgents fired on the policemen as they brought him into the lobby. One sergeant fell dead. The other shot back with his rapid-firing Sten gun, killed two of the attackers and then, out of ammunition, clubbed the other with the gun.

Stray bullets fatally wounded two Greek Cypriot hospital attendants and hurt one bystander

among the hospital personnel, outpatients and visitors crowding the lobby. But Hadjigeorgiou and the third assailant, his head bleeding, vanished at dawn in a corridor.

HUGE MANHUNT ON

That escaped prisoner and the three raiders were all described by British authorities as connected with EOKA, the national organization of Cypriot fighters.

That group has sought for 18 months, through shootings and bombings, to force Britain out of this Mediterranean island colony so Cyprus can unite with Greece.

The surviving sergeant searched the hospital in vain for the missing men. Other police came with dogs to pick up the trail. But an hour passed before the hospital was sealed off. The whole city

was sealed off too, roadblocks going up on every side. The biggest manhunt here yet got under way.

The British serviceman who died in Friday's gun battle brings to 51 the number of Britons killed during the anti-British campaign of terror.

PRICE ON HEAD

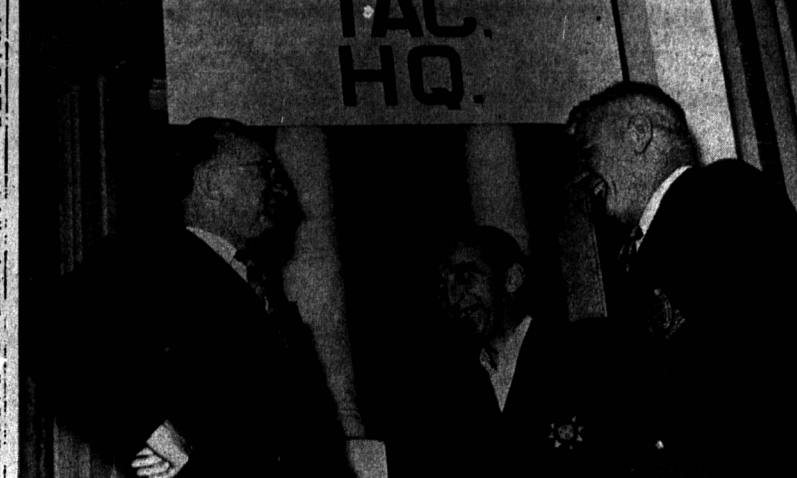
British authorities consider Hadjigeorgiou one of the most important figures in EOKA and put a price of \$25,000 on his head.

Three weeks ago, an EOKA raiding party snatched another EOKA prisoner from a hospital where unarmed Cypriot guards had taken him.

The raid came on the fourth day after EOKA ended an 11-day "suspension of operations" in its campaign for union with Greece.

In the course of the truce, the British government angered the organization by calling on its members to surrender and be deported to Greece.

EOKA replied that it would keep fighting until Britain resumed political negotiations with Greek Orthodox Archbishop Makarios, whom they called last March to the Seychelle Islands in the Indian Ocean.

Souris Teachers Urge Education Commission

Before the close of the school term a meeting of the teachers of the Souris Local was held at Souris School. There were 5 teachers in attendance. The president of the Souris Local, Mr. Jerry Flatau, presided. The feeling was expressed that a Royal Commission is a necessity in dealing with educational problems in this province.

Reasons why the teachers considered a Royal Commission necessary are: 1. The alarmingly small number of teachers who are being recruited yearly into the profession as compared to the number of teachers leaving the profession or to take up other work. 2. The pendulum of attention to our educational problems is unsatisfactorily balanced to the detriment of rural areas.

In opposition to the opinion of Kinkora Teachers expressed at a meeting of their Local the teachers of the Souris Local present felt that because of the shortage of qualified teachers, the implementation of a certification Board would at the present time be most opportune. It would tend to encourage recruitment of desired personnel.

It was the feeling of the meeting that the present type of summer School is not providing the adequate Academic Material.

A credit giving summer school plus a worthwhile salary differential dependent upon status would further encourage the recruitment of qualified personnel, it was suggested.

FARM WATER SUPPLY

Prince Edward Island is fortunate in having available almost everywhere throughout the Province, an adequate supply of pure water within the reach of every farm household. The very porous sandstone formation that underlies the Island is saturated with water that has been filtered through the soil and sandstone layers after falling in rain and snow to an average amount of 45 inches per year.

This abundant supply of pure water escapes by innumerable springs from the hillsides and valleys everywhere throughout the length and breadth of this "Garden of the Gulf" to form the many splendid trout streams and small rivers that empty into the Gulf of St. Lawrence, the Strait of Northumberland and the many great arms of the sea that form the magnificent bays on the north, south and east of Prince Edward Island.

These springs and brooks provide a bountiful supply of pure water for live stock on the majority of our farms during the summer season, when fences and fields are so arranged that the live stock may have access to water throughout the pasture season without expense or effort on the part of their owners.

It is true that everyone does not have springs so conveniently situated as others, but this same pure water is, however, available to every farm home wherever the owner chooses to locate a well. The cracks and seams in the sandstone formation that underlies every

every farm is such that a dug or drilled well can be relied upon to supply the household and the farm stock with the necessary water.

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to bring spring water to the homes and farmsteads.

In the past the use of metal pipes for conveying water from its source to the farmstead has frequently been unsatisfactory. The pipes had to be laid below the frost, which required the expensive digging and filling of ditches. The hard water, which is general in many districts, forms deposits that reduce the flow of water and eventually render the pipes useless. When metal pipes are used, they should be galvanized for the requirements and overlaid with all couplings encased in cement to protect them from corrosion.

In recent years polythene pipe has been a great boon to many farmers; with it they have been able to provide live stock with water with little trouble and at only a small outlay, in fields that do not have a natural water supply. A farmer near Cowanville in Queensland, who installed a half-inch polythene pipe in a back pasture for watering his cattle, reported that it took two men about half an hour to lay 500 feet of pipe, by using a special sub-soiler attachment to his tractor. This attachment guided the pipe to the bottom of a five-

teen-inch cut, and there was not even a sod to be turned back. One man rolled the pipe, which was all in one length, while the other drove the tractor at a walking pace. When a rock or other obstruction was encountered, he drove around it, as the pipe can easily be bent in any direction. A man can easily carry 1,000 feet of that size of polythene pipe.

JUST A FURROW

Others, who did not have a sub-soiler, just plowed a furrow, laid the pipe in it, and rolled the sod back. A jack-knife may be used to cut polythene pipe, in order to give an outlet to water anywhere into a trough or an automa
