## City's Recreational Needs May Be Solved By Survey

The solution to the recreational needs of Charlottetown is to be solved, or eased greatly, with the completion of a housing survey being carried out by Provincial Town Planner W. A. DeSilva, it was revealed during a panel discussion at the monthly meeting of the Metropolitan Committee, held in Montgomery Hall last night. The panel was chaired by Harwell Daley, one of four panel members. Mrs. Dorothy Corrigan, a member of the Metropolitan City Council, said that it would all hinge on Mr. DeSilva's report. She said certain portions would be declared as blighted areas, and these could be used for playgrounds and parks. Mrs. Corrigan estimated that a whole city block or part of a block would be sufficient to serve the recreational needs, providing work was continued in developing Victoria Park.

She stated that the eastern section of the city suffered greatly from the lack of proper playgrounds and parks. Mr. DeSilva, also on the panel, stated that it might be recommended in his report that the immediate areas surrounding the city's new schools be zoned for the purpose of providing parks and playgrounds.

## 'No Man's Land' Group Favors Amalgamation

A delegation from the "No Man's Land" group, consisting of Charlottetown, met with Education Minister L.G. Dewar yesterday to present the full facts of their school problem. The delegation, headed by M.A. Francis, stressed to the minister that they had not been inactive, but rather had gone into the problem in great detail. They said that four general meetings of the district had been held, as well as two meetings with the city since the problem developed. They said they were prepared to enter into any reasonable agreement with the city, and felt that amalgamation was the most desirable solution. The delegation said that a petition circulated some time ago in the area indicated that an amalgamation vote would show approval for union. The area was left out of the amalgamation of the former village of Spring Park and Charlottetown about five years ago. The area does not now belong to any school district, and children from the area have been attending city schools. The provincial government in the past paid \$70 per child per year to the city, but has stated it will no longer do so. The city has told the people of the area that, beginning next term, the price of sending a child to school will be \$100 per year. Some 40 children from the district are affected by the ruling.

## Zion Congregation To Mark 102nd Anniversary Sunday

The congregation of Zion Presbyterian Church will observe the 102nd anniversary of the church on Sunday June 3. Services will be conducted by the regular pastor, Rev. Donald A. Campbell, B.A., and special music for the occasion will be provided by the choir under the direction of Miss Madeline Wadden.

The congregation of Queen Square Church (on south side of Richmond Street) was officially recognized in 1860 and this congregation was amalgamated with the Free Church which was located on Upper Prince Street to form the Zion congregation in 1870. The last pastors of these two churches were Rev. George Sutherland and Rev. Alexander Falconer.

Following this union the congregation continued to grow and a more commodious edifice was required. This need was satisfied by the opening of the present church at the corner of Prince and Grafton Streets in May 1913. It is interesting to note that the cost of the building at that time was only \$65,000.

The new building, with a seating capacity of 1200 and the church school room accommodating 300, met the requirements of the congregation until quite recently when post-war demands, especially in the church school required the addition of 13 additional classrooms which was completed in 1960.

The congregation was served faithfully by the following ministers: Rev. John M. MacLeod, Rev. David Sutherland, Rev. D. B. MacLeod, Rev. W. H. Sedgewick, Rev. George E. Ross C. Taylor, Rev. M. Scott Fulton, Rev. R.G. Strathe, Rev. George Falconer.
