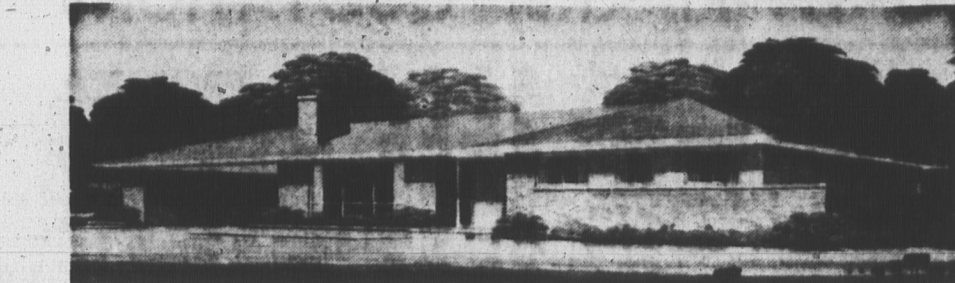

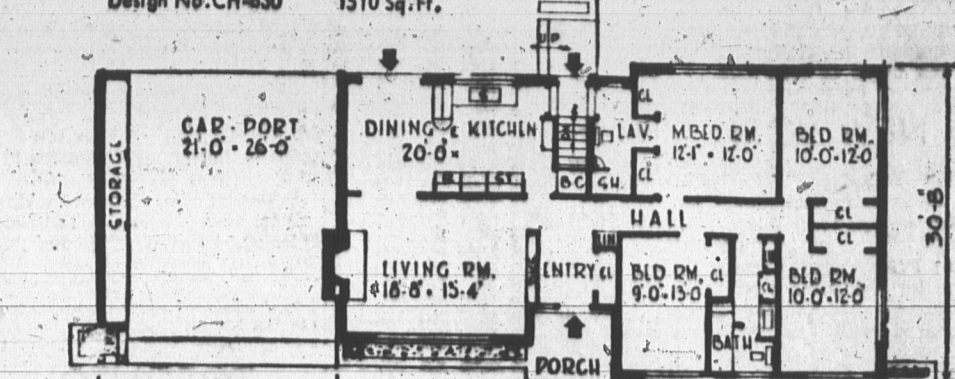

First Aid For The Ailing House

DAMP BOXES
QUESTION: We panelled part of our basement and covered the floor with tile. Recently we had occasion to pick up some paper boxes standing on this floor and found they were wet.

What would cause this? There seems to be no water leaking in anywhere. What should we do about this?

ANSWER: No matter how dry a basement seems, there is a certain amount of dampness present, caused by imperceptible seepage or condensation. For this reason the choice of items subject to mildew or moisture damage is not recommended.

In general, adequate air circulation and ventilation should be provided; keep cellar windows open as much as possible on clear, dry days. If the air seems excessively damp, and there is no water seepage through walls or floor, an electric dehumidifier will help.

PUNITY DRIES OUT
QUESTION: I have a problem with punity I use on my windows. Soon after I repunity a window, the punity dries out and cracks and pieces fall off. The frames are wood, not metal. How can I correct this?

ANSWER: The usual reason for punity failure on wood windows is that the punity is applied on a very dry wood. Such wood draws the oils out of the punity before it has a chance to harden. The wood should first be given a soaking coat of linseed oil, or a thin coat of paint. If paint is used, allow it to dry before punity will be satisfactory.

PAINTER'S CANVAS
QUESTION: Would it be possible to use painter's canvas to cover the seams on painted papered walls? Is painter's canvas expensive? Can it be put over bathroom walls that are water-damaged?

ANSWER: Painter's canvas is relatively inexpensive. It must be applied to a smooth, clean surface, and will cover cracks and small holes in the plaster. To cover the grooves in wainscoting, the surface should first be covered with deadening felt, which resembles soft paper, held all over with small tacks, about six inches apart. Then put on the painter's canvas, which can be painted, or papered, as desired. For the bathroom, recommend using top quality enamel because of its moisture resistance.

MOTHPROOFING RUG
QUESTION: We have a large all-wool, hand-knotted rug that we wish to mothproof. How can we do this?

ANSWER: Mothproofing preparations are widely available at hardware stores and hardware dealers. Follow label instructions carefully. There are also rug and upholstery cleaners available, containing silicone and fluorine, at some hardware stores, which clean, delay soiling and are moth resistant.

MUSTY ODOR IN ROOM
QUESTION: My son bought a home recently and one of the rooms has a musty odor. He has aired the room, cleaned and painted it, but it still smells musty. What can he do to get this smell out?

ANSWER: Not having any information as to the type of home, materials used in construction, whether over a finished basement or crawl space, etc., it is almost impossible to make pertinent suggestions. In general, musty odor is usually due to the presence of moisture in the area. The source of the moisture should be tracked down from underneath the room from ground moisture or from faulty chimney or window flashing, poor ventilation, moisture in the outside wall space, etc., and correct the cause of
