

Toronto Varsity Blues Top Don Loney's X-Men 20-14

HALIFAX (CP)—Crushing the power running of two fullbacks gave University of Toronto Blues a 20-14 victory over St. Francis Xavier University X-men in the fourth annual Atlantic Bowl game here Saturday.

The Blues came out with a conventional but daring offense in the second half to take the Robert L. Stantford trophy from the X-men for the first time. St. FX, most successful team in Maritime football history, had won all three previous playings of the bowl game against intermediate college

teams from Ontario. Toronto, first senior intercollegiate team invited to the game against the Atlantic Football Conference champions, stunned the X-men, a midwestern crowd of 4,000 with an early touchdown. Then they receded under the crisp St. FX running attack for most of two quarters before wearing down the Maritime champions-eight of them going to ways—in the final 30 minutes.

St. FX were ahead 14-7 at halftime and appeared to have the heavier Blues on the run.

CRUSHING X-MEN
But twin fullbacks Erkki Pu-

konen and Bill Watters, a pair of 19-year-olds of the battering-ram school, used their power and blocking up front to crush the X-men.

Pukonen, out with an injury through most of the regular season, scored two touchdowns and ran 133 yards on 23 carries for a 5.7 yard average. Watters, a 205-pounder with a back for dragging tacklers, had 78 yards rushing on 13 carries for an even six-yard average.

Between them they had 211 of Toronto's 219 yards rushing.

Blues scored the first time they had the ball, moving from the centre drive to paydirt in seven plays. Pukonen scored but the set-up play came from Watters, a 25-yard slant off left tackle.

The X-men wanted no time getting back in the game. Ralph (Woody) Hayes, an ex-U.S. marine who makes up for lack of size with speed and grit, grabbed the kickoff after touchdown and pranced 42 yards to the Toronto 53.

ROOKIE CONNECTIONS
Rookie quarterback Doug Billing hit end Paul Schonhart with a 20-yard pass and five plays later Neil Weber, veteran halfback probably in his last game for X-men, bashed over from two yards out.

Two roughing penalties against Toronto started St. FX to their second touchdown in the second quarter. Mixing passing with off-table plays, Billing moved his team to the two yards where Joe Franciose, power-runner from Portland, Me., bulldozed over.

With Pukonen and Watters doing the carrying, Toronto moved 52 yards in eight plays early in the third quarter before Pukonen went over. X-men were obviously tiring, getting up slower after each play, when Pukonen and Watters started their final rampage. Watters scored from the two in the fourth quarter.

Bill Giguere converted both St. FX touchdowns with Bryce Taylor booting two for Toronto.

End Farrell Fuston scored the touchdown that clinched the best-of-three Western Football Conference playoff for the Bombers after Calgary safety Harvey Wylie had missed on an attempt to score kick the football out of the Calgary end zone.

NEW YORK (AP)—Southern California and Wisconsin survived a vivid upset threat Saturday and made their way into the Rose Bowl and the Big Ten title game.

Oklahoma rallied down another major bowl berth in U.S. college football's last full weekend of regular season play.

Ten-ranked Southern California, trailing 1-0 going into the final quarter against UCLA, pulled out a 14-3 victory and clinched the Big Ten title. A conference spokesman announced the Trojans would be the league's Rose Bowl representative.

Wisconsin also came from behind in the final quarter to defeat Minnesota 14-9 and cement the Big Ten title. Then the Badgers were named to the Rose festival.

Louisiana State rolled over winless Tulane 38-0 and accepted a bid to the Cotton Bowl. The Tigers will face Texas Tech in closing its season with a 1:35 triumph over Texas A and M Thursday.

Oklahoma crushed Nebraska 34-6 and won the Big Eight title and the accompanying trip to the Orange Bowl. Oklahoma is expected to meet Alabama, Idaho this weekend.

Penn State, ranked ninth nationally and tops in the east, beat Pittsburgh 16-0 and re-

ceived a bid to the Gator Bowl. Oregon State is considered a likely opponent, Arkansas, which had already accepted a bid to the Sun Bowl, is also in its season with a 34-0 record over Texas Tech.

Terry Baker rallied Oregon State from a 15-6 halftime deficit to a 20-17 win over Oregon. Baker passed for two touchdowns.
