FEDS CUT PRICES

BERLIN (Reuters) — Price cuts of 20 to 30 per cent on many consumer goods such as shoes, clothes and pottery came into force in East Berlin radio announced.

DEPOSITS

To avoid further accumulation of unpaid accounts the trustees find it necessary to insist on a satisfactory deposit as well as arrangements for any balance before hospitalization. This system is in effect in practically all hospitals of a size comparable to the P. E. I. Hospital.

VISITING

Visiting Hours are as follows: Private and Semi-Private Rooms—Afternoons 2 to 4 o'clock; Evenings 7 to 9 o'clock; Wards—2 to 3 o'clock; 7 to 8 o'clock.

Maternity Floor

Private and Semi-Private Rooms—Afternoon 2:30 to 4 o'clock; Evenings 7 to 9 o'clock; Wards—2:30 to 3:30 o'clock; 7 to 8 o'clock.

The above visiting hours have been found to interfere to the least possible extent with the patients professional care and rest. For this reason visiting WILL NOT be permitted during other hours. NOT MORE than two visitors at any one time.

Also because of the danger of cross infection children are not allowed to visit in the hospital.

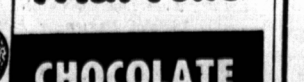
