Assault Trial Set

Alfred Wellington MacNeil, Charlottetown, has his case adjourned for trial until July 12 by Provincial Magistrate James E. Johnston, QC. In Magistrate's Court this morning when he appeared on two charges, unlawful confinement and assault. Owen Eric MacEwen, Craignap, charged with breaking and entering, was remanded until July 15 for preliminary hearing. Charged with impaired driving, Horace Earl Hewitt, Lower Montserrat, had his case adjourned until August 3 for trial. Three persons were fined \$20 and costs or 15 days for being intoxicated in a public place.

Fined In City Court

Freddie E. Arsenault, Charlottetown, was fined \$125 and costs or 30 days when he pleaded guilty to a charge of driving while impaired after originally charged with drunken driving in city police court yesterday morning. A.J. Haslam, QC, presided. Gerard Gallant, Southport, charged with allowing an unlicensed person to drive his motor vehicle, was fined \$10 and costs or five days. John Elmer MacPhee, city, charged with making a false statement, had his case adjourned to Saturday, July 9. Mrs. L. E. Ryan, city, charged with allowing her dog to run at large, had her case adjourned to July 18.

Produce Clinic Held

A produce clinic sponsored by the produce division of Atlantic Wholesalers was held recently at the Sherwood Hall for Lucky Dollar Food Stores of Prince Edward Island. The clinic was one of a series held in the Maritimes and was under the direction of C. T. Crawford, retail produce supervisor. The purpose was to provide training in all phases of produce retailing so as to insure top value and quality to consumers. The retailers were welcomed by Keith Cameron, supervisor of Lucky Dollar and Save Easy stores on P.E.I. The opening address was given by Carol MacLeod, vice president of sales for Atlantic Wholesalers. Bob Freeborn of Canadian United Fruit, Halifax, spoke to the merchants and staff members. He covered all phases of production of bananas from the plantation in the tropics to the consumer.

Application Is Rejected

In a written report of the decision of the Labor Relations Board released recently, by Board Chairman Charles R. McQuaid, the Board, in a split decision, rejected the application of Local Union Number 1181 of the United Packing House Workers of America for certification as the sole bargaining agent for certain employees of Langley Fruit Packers Limited of Montserrat.

The matter came before the Board for hearing on June 21, after the Union had complied with the provisions of the Industrial Relations Act by filing its written application in the form prescribed by the Board and supported by the other documents required by the Act.

The Company contested the application, registering nine objections touching on the technical validity of the formal application.

At the hearing, the Union was represented by its attorney, D. Frank Sigsworth, and counsel for the Company was Alan K. Scales.

Attended Conference

An emergency conference of the staff association of the National Employment Service and the Unemployment Insurance Commission was held in Ottawa this week.

Fortier, Chief Commissioner—UIC; Mr. Anderson, Chairman of the Bureau of Reclassification.

Alma Man Suffers Arm Injury

TOUGH STEPS

TAIPEI (AP)—Chinese Nationalist police have launched a campaign against "Beetle" haircuts, a growing fad among teenage boys on Formosa. Fifteen teenagers with the long hair have been taken to police stations in the last two days and shorn to the scalp. Police said Beetle haircuts are unsightly and usually favored by juvenile delinquents.
