**Publications Show Criticism Of Public View On Cigarettes**

TORONTO (CP) — Current publications of Canadian doctors and the United Church of Canada both criticize the casual public attitude toward the dangers of cigarette smoking. The Journal of the Canadian Medical Association says failure to place tobacco under government food and drug regulations "has probably cost the lives of millions." The United Church Observer urges the church to review a policy decision of 10 years ago that held smoking was "not a moral issue." Medical science has proved beyond doubt that a number of diseases, notably lung cancer, are related to cigarette smoking. The CMA Journal says "DANGER PROVED" is the church publication says "massive scientific and medical evidence has proven conclusively that cigarette smoking contributes to lung cancer. In Canada lung cancer now kills more persons than all infectious diseases — including TB — together." The CMA Journal says it was mere "mischance" that tobacco was not placed under food and drug legislation that could have controlled or banned its use because of its menace to health. The oversight has produced a "grotesque spectacle" the sight of government descending in swift and devastating severity on the cosmetics manufacturer, the cranberry producer and the rock candy makers while ignoring "the now universally-recognized dangers of cigarette smoking." Only a public outcry now could stem cigarette use, it says, but such a protest is not yet foreseeable.

**High Precision In Bombing Reported In U.S. Testing**

By ELTON C. FAY WASHINGTON (AP) — High bombing precision is reported to be indicated in preliminary data on the opening phases of United States nuclear tests in the Pacific. The air drop from a U.S. Air Force bomber of a nuclear device on Wednesday, first shot in the series, was described in some quarters as having been virtually perfect, detonating at precisely the point in mid-air which had been planned. A second air burst of a device was made Friday, but there was no immediate indication of results on this drop. Since the advent of the atomic bomb in 1945, dozens of test devices and actual bombs have been dropped by U.S. bombers. With few exceptions, they have been on or satisfactorily close to the aiming point. Only two known misses have been reported publicly. In the 1946 series at the Marshall Island proving grounds, an air drop from a B-29 exploded several hundred yards wide of the target. In 1956, a 10-megaton device dropped by a B-52 jet bomber was almost four miles off the intended bursting point.

The delivery aircraft must be well clear of the detonation area of the thermonuclear gadget if drops, and jet bombers can fly fast and climb high. In some cases, bombs are released while planes are at altitudes of 40,000 to 50,000 feet. Detonation may be as low as 10,000 feet or less, depending on the type of the test. This means the aircraft has several minutes to veer away in a 180-degree turn, dive to pick up speed and scream away from the area at a speed of 600 miles an hour while the bomb still is falling toward the bursting point.

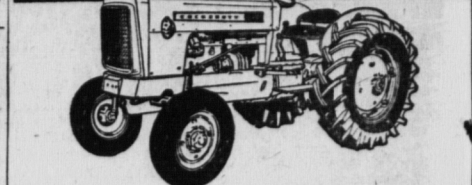
